Huskers Travel to Baylor in Key Big 12 Matchup

One of the more intriguing series in the Big 12 takes place this weekend, as No. 23 Nebraska travels to Baylor for a three-game series at the Baylor Ballpark. The Huskers and Bears will face off in a pair of evening matchups on Friday (7 p.m.) and Saturday (7 p.m.) before the series concludes Sunday at 1 p.m.

All three games will be carried on the Pinnacle Sports Network with Jim Rose and Gary Sharp calling all of the action and on the Internet on Huskers.com. Live stats will be available on Huskers.com, while a live video stream is available on HuskersNside, as every remaining regular-season game will be carried live on the premium site.

Nebraska (33-16, 10-11 Big 12) heads to Waco riding a modest three-game winning streak after sweeping a pair of mid-week contests against Northern Iowa (15-6, 5-2) at Hawks Field. This weekend's trip marks the Huskers' final regular-season trip outside the state, as they look to make a late-season push before the Big 12 Tournament in Arlington, Texas, in two weeks.

Baylor comes into the weekend looking to shed a two-game losing streak after dropping single games to UT-Arlington (3-4) and Texas State (4-7) earlier in the week. The Bears are 23-25 overall, but are in sixth in the Big 12 with an 10-9 record, just ahead of Nebraska's 10-11 league mark.

The Huskers and Bears have been two of the Big 12's top programs in recent years, combining for three of the league's past four regular-season titles (Nebraska in 2001 and 2003; Baylor in 2000) and each of the last six Big 12 Players of the Year, including former Huskers Matt Hopper (2003), Jed Morris (2002) and Shane Komine (2000). The Huskers and Bears have both made NCAA Regionals in each of the past five seasons, joining Texas as the only league schools to make that claim.

The Huskers are looking to turn their fortunes around in Waco, as NU has won just one in seven tries since the Big 12 was formed, a 15-4 win during the 2002 season. Five of the last six losses in Waco since 2000 have been by three runs or less, including a trio of one-run setbacks.

Saturday Time Change

Saturday's game at Baylor has been moved from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. to reduce conflict with Baylor's graduation ceremonies also slated Saturday.

Bruce Named Academic All-District VII

Junior outfielder Daniel Bruce was honored on Thursday, as he was a first-team CoSIDA Academic All-District VII selection. The Omaha, Neb., native is hitting .253 in 47 games with seven homers and 30 RBIs. In the classroom, he carries a 3.872 GPA in English and is bidding to become a two-time Academic All-Big 12 selection. Bruce is now eligible for CoSIDA Academic All-America honors and looks to become NU's ninth baseball Academic All-America since 1998.

Alex the Ironman

Third baseman Alex Gordon is the lone Husker to start all 49 games this season, and has been in the starting lineup the past 73 contests, dating back to April 23, 2003. This season, Gordon has played in 430.1 of Nebraska's 434.1 innings, sitting out the final two innings of NU's wins over Kent State (Feb. 22) and Boston College (March 21).

The Huskers' Bruise Brothers

At first glance, the Huskers' career hit-by-pitch list looks very much like the 2004 lineup. Of the top 11 players on the all-time list (21 or more HBP), five are current players and a sixth is second-year volunteer assistant Brandt Vlieger. NU hitters have been hit 87 times, 12 shy of the school and Big 12 record set in 2002.

Head Coach Mike Anderson
Northern Colorado, 1990
(80-34 (.701) - Second Season)

Mike Anderson is in his second season as Nebraska's head baseball coach, becoming the 23rd head coach in the program's history on June 21, 2002. Anderson has been associated with the NU program for the last decade, serving as an assistant from the fall of 1994 until his promotion to head coach in 2002.

Since joining the Nebraska staff in the fall of 1994, he has coached a total of 15 first-team all-conference honorees, while 19 of his former players have signed professional contracts. His most famous protegee is current Anaheim Angel All-Star Darin Erstad, who earned first-team All-America honors in 1995, when he was the first overall selection in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft.

Seven Huskers have been tabbed first-team All-Americans under Anderson's tutelage, while four players – Erstad (1995), Harvey (1999), Dan Johnson (2001) and Jed Morris (2002) – have been finalists for various national player-of-the-year awards.

In 2003, Anderson guided Nebraska to a 47-18 record. After being picked fourth in the preseason by the league coaches, the Huskers won the Big 12 regular-season title with a 20-7 record, clinching the title on the final day of the season. He became the second first-year Husker coach to lead NU to a conference title and the first since 1929.

The Huskers led the Big 12 in hitting in each of Anderson's final four seasons as an assistant coach, including a .338 team average – the second highest in school history – in 1999. The Huskers led the Big 12 in seven offensive categories in 2002, including batting average (.315), hits (753), runs scored (543), doubles (154), RBIs (491), sacrifice hits (49) and sacrifice flies (46). In 2001, Anderson coached a Husker offense that ranked in the top-10 nationally in both team average (.334) and runs per game (9.20), while also finishing second nationally in hits (787) and runs scored (607).

As the outfielders coach, Anderson has coached three All-Americans and seven all-conference selections, including Jeff Leise, who was a first-team All-American in 2002, while leading the Huskers to their second straight College World Series appearance.

Anderson's commitment to his student-athletes also extends to the classroom. Over the past nine years, the Huskers have placed 40 players on the first-team all-conference squad. Nebraska has had eight CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, including two in each of the past three seasons and 11 first-team academic all-district selections in the past seven seasons.

Before arriving in Lincoln in the fall of 1994, Anderson was the top assistant coach at the University of Northern Colorado in Greeley, Colo. He joined the Bears' staff after four years as a head coach with the Northern Colorado Lab School. From 1983 through 1986, Anderson was an outfielder at Northern Colorado for College Hall of Fame Coach Tom Petroff. Anderson was an eighth-round pick by the California Angels, spending four seasons with the Angels organization.

Anderson earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Northern Colorado in 1990. Anderson graduated from Eaton High School in Eaton, Colo., where he was a first-team All-Colorado shortstop for Coach Jim Danley.

Zach Kroenke (pronounced KRON-neck-key) • So. • LHP • 6-3 • 210 • Omaha, Neb.

Overview: Kroenke seeks his team-high eighth win of the season in Friday's series opener...has made 12 starts, going 7-2 with a 2.95 ERA, while striking out 62 in 82.1 innings...ranks in the top 10 in the league in ERA (eighth), opponent batting average (.225, sixth) and complete games (two, fourth)...has pitched at least five innings in 11 of his 12 starts and has allowed two runs or less in seven of his last nine outings dating back to March 12...will spend the upcoming summer pitching in the Cape Cod League for Harwich. **Last Start:** Kroenke took the loss in Saturday's opener with OSU, allowing career highs in hits (10) and runs (seven) over 6.1 innings in the Huskers' 7-4 loss...allowed two homers - only the third and fourth surrendered and the first time he allowed more than one homer in any appearance. **2004:** Kroenke tossed his second complete game of the season, allowing three hits in a 4-1 victory over No. 10 Texas A&M on April 30...retired the first 13 hitters and fanned four in a 108-pitch gem...suffered his first loss of the season, allowing six runs on nine hits in just 3.1 innings at No. 1 Texas (4/23)...went eight solid innings against Missouri, allowing two runs on seven hits, but did not factor into the decision in NU's 3-2 loss...allowed two runs in the second then allowed only two base runners in his final six frames...turned in a strong eight innings against Texas Tech, scattering seven hits and allowing one run in a 3-1 victory (4/9)...fanned nine and held the Red Raiders scoreless over his last seven innings...earned Big 12 honors against Kansas State, allowing one hit in a complete-game win over the Wildcats (4/2)...struck out seven and allowed one runner in scoring position as he faced one batter over the minimum...tossed the first individual one-hitter since Aaron Marsden tossed a one-hitter vs. Texas A&M in 2002...was solid against KU, holding the Jayhawks, who led the Big 12 in hitting with a .346 average, to five hits over six-plus innings in a 3-2 win (3/26)...was dominant against Boston College, allowing one run in 7.1 innings (3/19)...struck out eight and allowed one hit over the first 6.1 innings...struck out a career-high 11 Wildcats, including six straight, in 6.1 innings of work against Northwestern in the season opener (2/20). **2003:** Was one of the Big 12's top freshman hurlers, going 6-2 with a 2.72 ERA in 59.2 innings...enjoyed nearly a 2-to-1 strikeout-to-walk ratio (35-to-19) while holding opponents to a .239 batting average... allowed three runs or less in 14 of his 15 appearances and combined on a pair of shutouts (Cal Poly and at Kansas)...shared Big 12 Pitcher-of-the-Week honors, going 2-0 in 11.2 innings in wins over Cal Poly and Oklahoma...tossed a complete-game six-hitter against Eastern Michigan in the 2003 NCAA Lincoln Regional...suffered losses against eventual CWS champion and No. 1 Rice and CWS qualifier Texas (at Rosenblatt Stadium). **Prior:** Ranked among the top 200 players in the nation according to Team One Baseball, Kroenke pitched for Northwest High School in Omaha...earned first-team All-Nebraska honors from the Lincoln Journal Star, going 4-5 with a 3.42 ERA, while leading the state with 90 strikeouts in 53 innings.

Phil Shirek (pronounced SHEAR-ik) Jr. • RHP • 6-3 • 210 • Minot, N.D.

Overview: Junior who has been in the Huskers' weekend rotation for most of the 2004 campaign and makes his ninth start of the season (27th of his career) on Saturday...is 5-1 with a 3.33 ERA, while holding foes to a .257 average...ranks 12th in the Big 12 in ERA and has allowed nine extra base hits in 51.1 innings of work...is 14-6 in 48 career appearances, striking out 126 in 160.2 career innings...his 14 wins and 26 career starts are the most of any current Husker and needs two more starts to rank 10th on NU's career list. **Last Outing:** Pitched well in a no-decision against Oklahoma State on Sunday, allowing two runs on four hits in 5.2 innings - his longest outing since March 28. **2004:** Shirek suffered his first loss of the year, allowing four runs (three earned) on eight hits in four innings vs. No. 10 Texas A&M (5/1)... Turned in a strong start at No. 1 Texas, taking a shutout into the sixth, but did not factor in the decision (4/24)...allowed two runs on three hits, while fanning four Longhorns...went five-plus innings in a 4-0 shutout of Kansas State (4/3)...allowed just three hits in helping the Huskers to a fourth straight shutout...had one of the best outings of his career in a complete-game seven-inning win against Kansas (3/28)...scattered seven hits and struck out a career-best 10 Jayhawks...allowed one run on four hits over six innings in a 10-1 win over Boston College (3/21)...pitched well in the series finale at San Diego State in PETCO Park, allowing two runs on six hits in 6.2 innings in his first start of the season (3/14)...tossed 4.2 innings of relief vs. West Virginia to pick up the win (3/7)...faced one over the minimum through his first four innings against the Mountaineers...also made scoreless relief outings vs. No. 15 North Carolina and Kent State...pitched for Harwich in the Cape Cod League, going 0-1 with a 1.67 ERA in 10 outings last summer. **2003:** Compiled a 5-3 record with a 3.90 ERA in 18 games, including 10 starts...held opponents to a .227 average in 62.1 innings...earned his first career Big 12 win, allowing one run on four hits in seven innings against Oklahoma State on May 12, helping the Huskers to a series sweep over the Cowboys...was dominant in a win over Creighton on April 29, tossing eight shutout innings and allowing one runner to reach scoring position...struck out two and retired 13 of the first 14 batters he faced. **2002:** Tabbed a freshman All-American by Collegiate Baseball, going 4-2 with a 3.45 ERA in 18 appearances. **Prior:** NU's first signee from North Dakota since current Anaheim Angels All-Star Darin Erstad...Gatorade Circle of Champions Player of the Year in the state of North Dakota in both baseball and football (QB) as a high school senior...broke the American Legion national tournament record with 20 strikeouts in a regional game, eclipsing the national tournament record held by former Baltimore Orioles great Dave McNally...younger brother, Charlie, signed a National Letter-of-Intent with NU last November.

Scouting Baylor

Baylor enters this weekend's series with a 23-25 record (10-9 Big 12) after falling to Texas-Arlington, 4-3, on Tuesday and Texas State, 7-4, on Wednesday at home. Steve Smith (366-228-1 in 10 seasons) has led Baylor to six straight NCAA Regionals, including a Super Regional appearance last spring when they lost to LSU in three games.

Offensively, the Bears have six starters above .300, including Reid Brees, who is at .343 with 12 doubles. Michael Griffin tops BU in doubles (14), homers (eight) and RBIs (36), while Josh Ford also has eight homers and 29 RBIs. BU's strength is pitching, where it is second in the Big 12 with a 3.24 ERA, and features a balanced staff with eight pitchers earning at least two wins. Trey Taylor is 5-3 with a 3.22 ERA, while Sean Walker is 3-5 with a 3.79 ERA in 73.2 innings.

Baylor holds a 20-14-1 edge in the all-time series that dates back to 1938, including a slim 12-10 edge since the beginning of the Big 12 in 1997. The home team has won the regular-season series in each of the past four seasons, as NU took 2-of-3 in Lincoln in 2003. In all, the teams split six meetings in 2003, as Baylor knocked off the Huskers with a pair of wins in the Big 12 Tournament in Oklahoma City.

Last Season vs. Baylor

May 16: (Nebraska 6, Baylor 2) - Aaron Marsden fired a complete-game six hitter, leading the Huskers to a 6-2 win in the series opener. The junior from Grand Forks, N.D., struck out a career-high 12 hitters, while tossing his fourth complete game of the year. Marsden held a Bear offense that was ranked ninth nationally in hitting to just six hits. Alex Gordon went 2-for-4 with a pair of RBIs, while Jeff Leise had two hits and a pair of RBIs.

May 17: (Baylor 7, Nebraska 1) - Sean Walker allowed one run in six innings, while Baylor cruised to a 7-1 victory. Walker held NU to seven hits, as Bubbs Merrill's RBI single in the second accounted for all of the Huskers' scoring. NU finished with nine hits, including three by Joe Simokaitis and two by Matt Hopper, but could not capitalize, hitting into three double plays and stranding seven runners. Quinton Robertson allowing five runs on seven hits in six innings to take the loss for the first time in nine starts.

May 18: (Nebraska 7, Baylor 6) - Nebraska claimed its second Big 12 regular-season title with a 7-6 come-from-behind win. Alex Gordon's bases loaded walk with two outs in the eighth inning scored Jake Mullinax with the winning run. Mullinax reached on third baseman Paul Witt's throwing error to start the rally before walks to Jeff Leise and Matt Hopper loaded the bases. The Huskers, who trailed 6-4 entering the bottom of the sixth, scored two runs when Joe Simokaitis' ground ball went through Witt's legs for an error with one out and runners on second and third to tie the score. NU scored seven runs on just six hits, as Matt Hopper was the only Husker to manage two hits, including his 18th homer of the season. Mike Sillman fired 1.2 shutout innings to pick up his first win of the year.

May 22 (Nebraska 9, Baylor 5) - Alex Gordon went 3-for-5 with four RBIs to lead the Huskers to a 9-5 win over Baylor in the second round of the Big 12 Tournament. Gordon tied career bests in both hits and RBIs and delivered the game's biggest hit, a two-run triple in the seventh off reliever Abe Woody. Gordon led the Huskers' 10-hit effort, while NU got a strong start from Quinton Robertson, who allowed two runs on seven hits in six innings. Mike Sillman fanned the final two batters after the Bears loaded the bases in the ninth to pick up the save.

May 24 (Baylor 7, Nebraska 5) - The Huskers went 14 innings - their longest game in five years - but fell to Baylor in the Big 12 Tournament. Steve Hale and Mike Sillman turned in a heroic bullpen effort, holding BU to just two infield hits in nine innings before the Bears scored twice in the 14th. Sillman went 5.1 innings - his longest outing in over two years - but suffered the loss after Hale tossed 4.1 innings of no-hit relief. The Huskers spotted BU a 5-0 lead, but scored three in the fourth before Alex Gordon's two-run homer in the eighth tied the score.

May 24 (Baylor 6, Nebraska 2) - Nebraska was held to a season-low two hits in a 6-2 loss to Baylor. The loss, NU's second of the day to the Bears, ended the Huskers' hopes for a fourth Big 12 tourney title. Alex Gordon, who went 1-for-4 with an RBI, and Bubbs Merrill accounted for all of NU's offense, as BU scored six unanswered runs. Phil Shirek took the loss, allowing five runs in 2.1 innings.

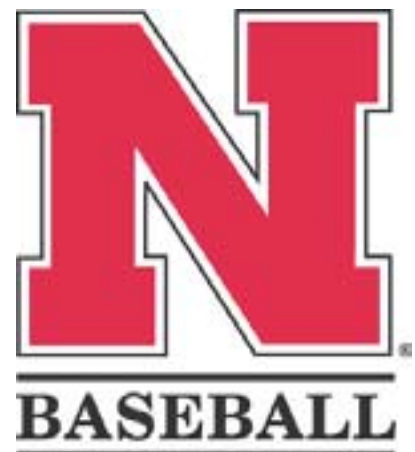

Welcome to Hawks Field at Haymarket Park

The 2002 season marked the debut of the Huskers' new home – Hawks Field at Haymarket Park. The field is named in memory of Myrna Hawks, as the Hawks family was one of the major benefactors in the Haymarket Park project.

In March of 2000, Howard and Myrna Hawks guaranteed the unfunded portion of UNL's \$10.6 million commitment to the baseball/softball complex, which enabled the University to move forward in a joint venture with the City of Lincoln and NEBCO, Inc., the owners of the Lincoln Saltdogs in the Northern League. The University retained the right to name the field and on Feb. 23, 2002, the University of Nebraska Board of Regents approved the name of Hawks Field. It was formally dedicated in pregame ceremonies against Kansas on April 28, 2002. The ballpark includes 4,500 chair-back seats, 16 suites, a Diamond View Lounge and a Sub-Air system that allows the field to grow grass nearly year-round. The park is one of only three fields in the country that uses this state-of-the-art heating system (Invesco Field at Mile High and Safeco Field are the others). Other highlights of the complex include a 1,400-square foot clubhouse for the Husker baseball program, a video board/scoreboard in right center field, the Buck Beltzer Playground for kids down the right field line and numerous restrooms and concession stands.

Hawks Field, as well as the adjacent Bowlin Stadium – the 2,500-seat softball stadium which opened in the fall of 2001 – are both located inside Haymarket Park, a 32-acre complex that includes both stadiums as well as the plaza area and 2,000 parking stalls. The 2002 season marked the first time since World War II that the Huskers did not play at the former sight of Buck Beltzer Stadium on the Nebraska campus.

- With two weeks remaining in the regular season, sophomore third baseman Alex Gordon is looking to become the Big 12's first triple crown (average, homers and RBIs) winner. Gordon is second in the league in hitting, homers and RBIs, as he is hitting .386 with 16 homers and 67 RBIs. The last conference player (Big Eight/SWC) to lead the league in all three categories in a single season was Oklahoma State's Pete Incaviglia (.464-48-143) in 1985.

- Throughout 2004, the Huskers have bolted to fast starts, outscoring opponents 54-23 in the opening inning of games and 144-63 over the first three innings.

- One trait the 2004 Huskers have shown is the ability to win close games, as Nebraska's six one-run wins not only equals the entire 2003 team's total, but is the most since the 1998 season.

- Gordon looks to extend Nebraska's streak of Big 12 home run champions, as he is third in the league with 16 round trippers, two behind Travis Metcalf of Kansas for the league lead. A Husker has led the Big 12 in homers in each of the past four seasons, dating back to the 2000 season (Matt Hopper and Dan Johnson, 2000; Dan Johnson, 2001; Jed Morris, 2002; Matt Hopper, 2003).

While Gordon adds his legacy to an impressive list of Husker sluggers, he also looks to become the first Husker third baseman to earn first-team all-conference accolades since Derek Dukart in 1994. Gordon's performance not only potentially puts him among the favorites for league honors, but also compares very favorably to NU's last two Big 12 Players of the Year (Jed Morris in 2002 and Matt Hopper in 2003). In addition, Ken Harvey's numbers from the 1999 season when he was Smith Award and Golden Spikes finalist are included below.

- Jesse Boyer reached safely in 10 straight plate appearances in wins over Oklahoma State and Northern Iowa earlier this week, while he swiped four bases and scored six runs in that stretch. Boyer is batting .471 over NU's last five games.

- One of the strengths of the Huskers in 2004 has been the play of their defense. NU is second in the Big 12 and seventh nationally with a .975 fielding percentage, a pace that would break the school mark of .971 set in 1994 and 1995. The Huskers are

19-3 this season when they play errorless baseball. NU has had a pair of stretches of at least 45 innings without an error, including a 63.1 inning stretch in March - the longest stretch in over 20 years.

- Shortstop Joe Simokaitis is rapidly climbing NU's career fielding lists. With 443 assists entering the Baylor series, he needs eight more assists to move past Kurt Eubanks (450, 1981-85) for sole possession of fourth place on NU's career list. Simokaitis has committed one error in his last 16 games, as he fielding at a .960 clip on the season.

- The Huskers have scored five or more runs in an inning 11 times in 2004, spanning a total of 10 games, including five-run innings on Monday and Tuesday.

- Fifth-year senior Justin Pekarek enjoyed a busy weekend, earning a diploma and his third win over a ranked opponent. Pekarek, a business management major who missed graduation ceremonies because of NU's series at Oklahoma State, earned the win in Monday's finale, tossing 4.1 shutout innings of relief. Pekarek, who had two career wins prior to this season, is 6-1 on the year and also enjoyed wins over No. 15 North Carolina, No. 1 Texas and is 6-1 on the season. He has not allowed a run in his last four appearances dating back to April 20.

- In Tuesday's win against Northern Iowa, pitcher Mike Sillman made his Husker debut in right field in the ninth inning, marking the first time since high school that the Omaha native has been used in the field.

- The Huskers have been ranked in the national polls for the past 81 weeks, dating back to April of 2000.

- Second baseman Jake Mullinax was chosen as the Husker Power Baseball Lifter of the Year prior to the May 2 game against Texas A&M. He was chosen by a vote of his teammates after lowering his body fat percentage from 19 percent to 10 percent and gaining seven pounds of mass. He also increased his vertical jump 2.5 inches and improved his Performance Index 215 points. Mullinax beat out finalists Alex Gordon, Zach Kroenke and Phil Shirek for the award.

Last Time Out

NU picked up a pair of mid-week wins, getting strong starts from freshmen Brad Furnish and Jon Klausung to sweep Northern Iowa at Hawks Field.

Tuesday (Nebraska 15, Northern Iowa 6) - Jesse Boyer had three hits and scored four times while Curtis Ledbetter and John Grose belted homers in Nebraska 15-6 win over Northern Iowa. Boyer went 3-for-4 and matched season highs in runs and stolen bases (three). While Boyer paced the Huskers' 17-hit outburst, Ledbetter went 2-for-4 with a homer, a three-run blast in the first, and four RBIs, while Grose had two hits, including his fifth round tripper of the year, and drove in two runs. Six different

Huskers had at least two hits, including three each by Boyer and Jake Mullinax, while five players drove in two or more runs, helping NU to its highest run total since Feb. 22. Brad Furnish was the beneficiary of NU's offensive outburst, scattering six hits over a career-high 5.2 innings to improve to 3-0.

Wednesday (Nebraska 5, Northern Iowa 2) - Jon Klausung allowed two runs over six-plus innings to earn his first collegiate win, as No. 23 Nebraska downed Northern Iowa, 5-2, Wednesday afternoon. Klausung scattered five hits and struck out a career-high five Panthers to improve to 1-0 on the year. The Huskers managed just five hits off three Panther pitchers, but received solo homers from Alex Gordon, his 16th of the year, and Jake Mullinax, who also scored twice in the victory. Colin Shockey and John Grose also drove in runs in the victory.

Gordon Invited to USA National Team Trials

Nebraska third baseman Alex Gordon was one of 19 players invited by USA Baseball to participate in the USA National Team Trials June 20-26 in Durham, N.C. Gordon was one of three Big 12 players invited, joining the Texas duo of J. Brent Cox and Taylor Teagarden. An additional 17 players will be invited later in the spring for the 20-man final roster. Gordon is bidding to become Nebraska's first Team USA player since Paul Meyers was selected in 1985.

Gordon Stacks Up at Third

One of the main reasons for the Huskers' offensive firepower has been the play of third baseman Alex Gordon. The sophomore has been a steady force in the middle of the Husker lineup, leading the Big Red in nearly every offensive category. Gordon, who was named to the Golden Spikes Watch List last month, also paces NU in multi-hit games (22) and multi-RBI efforts (17) and has been walked a team-high 39 times. The following is a comparison of Gordon against the preseason All-American third basemen picked by national publications.

Ledbetter on a Tear

Junior first baseman Curtis Ledbetter has been nearly unstoppable since returning to the lineup on March 31. The 6-3, 220-pound junior first baseman is hitting .346 with all eight of his homers and 34 RBIs over the last 27 games, raising his season totals to .308-8-51. He was named the Big 12's Offensive Player of the Week on April 19, batting .563 with two homers, three doubles and five RBIs in four games. Ledbetter also leads the Huskers in game-winning RBIs with 11, including a three-run shot vs. Northern Iowa on Tuesday.

Husker Baseball Notes vs. Baylor

Aces High

After playing a supporting role in NU's Big 12 title run last season, sophomore left-hander Zach Kroenke has become the ace of the 2004 staff. The Omaha Northwest product has followed in the footsteps of some of the best pitchers in school history, going 7-2 with a 2.95 ERA in 12 starts. Kroenke's numbers are comparable to former Big 12 Pitchers of the Year Shane Komine (2000-01) and Aaron Marsden (2003). Kroenke has a personal-best nine-game winning streak snapped at No. 1 Texas on April 23. In fact, two of his four career losses have come against the nation's top-ranked team (Rice in 2003; Texas in 2004).

Gordon Honored Twice

Gordon was named to Baseball America's mid-season All-America team in early April. The Lincoln native was one of 17 sophomores chosen for the team, which includes one starter at each position, one utility player and six pitchers (five starters and a reliever). Baseball America lists a team for each of the four classes.

He was also honored as one of 30 players selected to the Golden Spikes Watch List. The Golden Spikes Award has been presented annually by USA Baseball since 1978 to the player who exhibits exceptional athletic ability and exemplary sportsmanship. Gordon is one of four Big 12 players on the 30-player watch list, joining Texas' pitching duo of J.P. Howell and Huston Street and Oklahoma State catcher Jason Jaramillo.

Grose Named to Johnny Bench Watch List

John Grose has been named to the Johnny Bench Watch List. The senior from Henderson, Nev., is a three-year starter for the Huskers and a career .290 hitter. Grose has thrown out nearly 35 percent of would-be base stealers this spring, as Nebraska has allowed only 28 stolen bases. He is one of 45 candidates on the initial Watch List, which will be trimmed to 10 semifinalists this week. Justin Cowan was one of three finalists for the 2000 Johnny Bench Award.

Second (Base) to None

With the graduation of Big 12 Player of the Year Matt Hopper, one of the questions entering 2004 was who would supply some of Hopper's home run power. Second baseman Jake Mullinax has become one of NU's long ball hitters in 2004. The senior co-captain from Hesperia, Calif., is second on the team with eight homers - including five in conference play. Mullinax, who also ranks among the Big 12 leaders with a .347 average and 12 sacrifices, is tied with Curtis Ledbetter with a team-high 19 RBIs in Big 12 games only.

Getting Defensive

Several defenders have played a key role in the Huskers ranking in the top 10 nationally in defense. First baseman Curtis Ledbetter has made just one error in 379 chances for a .997 fielding percentage, a mark better than All-American Ken Harvey's .996 mark in 1999 - the year he was named

Easton/Redline National Defensive Player of the Year. Up the middle, NU's double play combination of Jake Mullinax and Joe Simokaitis has combined for 13 errors in 405 chances (.967 pct.). Simokaitis, who holds NU's single-season record for assists (194 in 2003) is fifth in school annals with 443 career assists. In addition, center fielder Colin Shockey has not committed an error in 112 chances this season, while third baseman Alex Gordon has made one miscue in his last 14 contests. In fact, the Husker infield has not committed an error since May 1, a span of six games.

Pitchers Set Big 12 Shutout Streak Mark

In early April, the Nebraska pitching staff established a record with 43.1 scoreless innings. The record, which included 42 complete innings and parts of two others, broke the Big 12 record of 41 set by Texas in 2002. In all, the Husker pitchers tossed a pair of one-hitters, a three-hitter and a five-hitter before Kansas State scored a run in the fourth inning of NU's win on April 4, marking the first run scored by a Husker opponent since March 28. The four consecutive shutouts equaled a mark set over a four-game stretch over parts of the 1977 and 1978 seasons. Oklahoma held the Big Eight record with 31 straight scoreless innings in 1971, while Arizona State holds the NCAA mark with 64 straight scoreless innings back in 1972.

Ouch!

Husker hitters have been hit at an alarming rate in 2004, getting plunked an amazing 87 times in 49 contests. In all, Nebraska has been hit by three or more pitches 19 times, including a season-high six against UW-Milwaukee on March 30. Colin Shockey leads the Huskers with 15 HBPs, while Daniel Bruce has been hit 14 times, increasing his school record to 56 in 167 career games. At the current rate, NU's projected 56-game regular-season total of 99 would tie the school and Big 12 record set by NU (in 68 games) in two years ago.

Stinky Becker Cuts Out Inheritance

Left-hander Jeremy Becker has made a name for himself as one of the Big 12's best situational relievers. While he does not have a save, the 5-11, 215-pounder from Scottsbluff has played a major role in NU's success. He has allowed just three of 23 inherited runners to score in 2004. The academic All-America candidate went nearly an entire year (25 runners over his last 21 appearances) without allowing an inherited runner to score from April 25, 2003 to April 17, 2004.

While Becker's numbers are quite impressive, he is one of several relievers who have made it difficult on opponents. Brett Jensen has allowed just two of 17 inherited runners to score, and has not allowed one to score in his 14 appearances dating back to March 13. Other Huskers who excel in that role include right-handers Tim Schoeninger (5-of-18) and Dustin Timm (5-of-17), although Timm has been in the weekend rotation for the past month.

Simokaitis Shows Unexpected Power

While shortstop Joe Simokaitis is more noted for his defensive expertise, the St. Louis, Mo., native provided one of the biggest offensive highlights of the 2004 season on April 30, with his three-run homer off Texas A&M ace Jason Meyer. The homer, his first since April 17, 2003 and second in 524 career at-bats, broke a 1-all tie and gave NU a 4-1 win over the No. 10 Aggies. It also marked the first homer that Meyer allowed in 70.2 innings this season, as NU handed the Aggie lefty his first loss in nine decisions.

Up Next

Nebraska travels to Omaha's Rosenblatt Stadium Tuesday night for a showdown with Creighton. First pitch is slated for 7 p.m. and the game will be shown state-wide on Nebraska Educational Television.

The Hottest Ticket in Town: Husker Baseball

The list is led by two-time American League All-Star Darin Erstad, who was the No. 1 overall pick by the Angels in 1995. Other Major League Huskers include Kansas City Royals first baseman Ken Harvey (1997-99), Los Angeles Dodgers pitcher Troy Brohawn (1992-94), San Diego Padre Todd Sears (1995-97) and Seattle Mariner Jamal Strong (1999-2000), who was called up last September. In all, a total of 19 former Huskers have reached the Major Leagues. In Baseball America's 2004 Top Prospects list, Strong was the Mariners' 10th-best prospect, while Dan Johnson, a seventh-round pick of Oakland in 2001, is listed as the organization's No. 3 prospect.

Four Huskers Honored by Dallas Morning News

Four Huskers were honored by the Dallas Morning News on the publication's preseason All-Big 12 team. Junior Curtis Ledbetter (DH), Joe Simokaitis (SS) and Quinton Robertson (RHP) were chosen for the first team, while Jake Mullinax (2B) was the lone Husker chosen for the second team. Nebraska and Texas were the only schools to have more than two first-team selections.

Bruce Voted Best Outfield Arm in Big 12

Junior outfielder Daniel Bruce was voted as having the best defensive arm in the Big 12 in a poll of conference coaches for Baseball America. The Omaha native had a team-high six outfield assists in 2003, and 11 outfield assists in his three seasons as a Husker. Bruce, who could see time in both center and right field, batted .311 with six homers and 33 RBIs as a sophomore.

Huskers Honored for Academic Work

A total of 15 Husker baseball players were honored earlier this season with selection to the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll. The baseball players were among 286 Husker student-athletes who were recognized for their success in the classroom.

The honorees are led by junior outfielder Daniel Bruce, who completed the fall semester with a 4.0 GPA in English. The Omaha native is a CoSIDA Academic All-America candidate and carries a 3.872 cumulative grade-point average. Other upperclassmen honored include senior captains John Grose, Justin Pekarek and Jake Mullinax and fellow senior Mike Sillman and former pitcher Jamie Rodrigue, who is completing his degree in physical education. Four true freshmen were also among the honorees, including catcher Johnny Bowden, infielder Al Smith and pitchers Matt Foust and Jon Klausung, as they all had 3.0 GPAs during their first semester on campus.

Nebraska has not only enjoyed an unprecedented run of success on the playing field, but has also shined in the classroom as well.

- Nebraska has had five first-team CoSIDA Academic All-Americans since 1999, including Jeff Leise, who was the Academic All-American of the Year in both 2002 and 2003.

- Leise and Aaron Marsden were both chosen as first-team CoSIDA All-Americans in 2003. Nebraska was the only school with two first-teamers on the 11-member squad encompassing all of Division I baseball.

- Twenty of 39 players recorded grade-point averages of 3.0 or better during the 2003 season.

- Nebraska had a league-best six first-team academic All-Big 12 selections in 2003.

- The Huskers have been finalists for the Herman Award - representing the highest men's and women's team GPAs on campus - in two of the past three seasons.

- A trio of Huskers have been nominated for CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, as pitchers Mike Sillman (3.775 GPA in business administration) and Jeremy Becker (3.674 GPA in agricultural engineering) are joined by outfielder Daniel Bruce (3.872 GPA in English). This is the second time that Bruce has been nominated and the first for both Becker and Sillman.

- The Nebraska baseball team joined the men's basketball, track and cross country teams as the four finalists for the Herman Award. The honor is presented to the men's and women's teams with the highest GPA over the previous two semesters. It marked the second straight season that the Husker baseball team has been a finalist for the campus award (won by the cross country team).
