## NOTES

### Nebraska's Jake Young Memorialized

Memorial services for Jacob C. Young have been planned in Kansas City, Mo., and Midland, Texas. The 34-year-old former University of Nebraska All-America football player was in Bali, Indonesia, when an apparent terrorist attack killed nearly 200 people on Saturday, Oct. 12, 2002.

Young was in Bali competing in a final rugby tournament with his Hong Kong Football Club teammates prior to moving back to Kansas City after working for a law firm, Clifford Chance in Hong Kong, the last two years. Young's wife Laura and their two-year-old son Wilson had already returned to the United States to move into their new home in Kansas City, Mo., where Jake was to begin work on Oct. 16, as a lawyer at Dickinson Financial Corp. Young was an Academic All-America in 1988-89 and lettered for four seasons for then-coach Tom Osborne's Huskers.

A memorial service was held Saturday, Oct. 26, at Overland Park, Kan. In lieu of flowers, donations still can be made to the Jake Young Award, c/o University of Nebraska Foundation, 1111 Lincoln Mall, Lincoln, Neb., 68508, or to Jake Young Memorial Fund, c/o Bank Midwest, 1100 Main St., Suite 215, Kansas City, Mo., 64015.

A memorial service will also be held in Midland, Texas, where he graduated from high school and his parents, Jacob and Barbara Young, reside. The service will be Wednesday, Oct. 30, at 4 p.m. (CST) at the First Baptist Church in Midland, Texas.

University of Colorado students, staff and alumni also have been in mourning for CU business graduate Karri Cassner (not a student-athlete but remembered by many), who was vacationing in Bali from her recent home area of suburban Dallas-Fort Worth and died in the Oct. 12 attack.

### Long Recipients

Some big numbers and student-athletes who may not necessarily show up in the statistics are nonetheless raising eyebrows with big-play receptions for Big 12 teams.

Three of the 15 receivers nationally (research by the University of Houston) with a minimum of 12 catches through games of October 19 came from Big 12 schools, and they continued to be impressive through last week's encounters.

### Weekly Video Highlight Package

For the sixth year in a row, the Big 12 Conference will transmit a weekly videotape highlight segment nationally via satellite from 3:30-4:30 p.m. (Central Time) each Tuesday. The package includes game action footage, player and coach interviews, and features provided by Big 12 institutions. Three minutes of highlights and interviews of each league team will be transmitted.

### Telestar 4-C, Transponder 11

Telestar 4-C is located at Orbital Slot 89 W. Transponder 11 is received vertically at 3920 MHz, and standard audio channels at 6.2-6.8

Though they are just under the catches per game qualifications for the Top 12 receivers in the league in two instances, Texas A&M's Bethel Johnson has chipped in 23 catches for 463 yards and a 20.1 average for his team's rejuvenated air attack. Kansas State's Taco Wallace has 24 receptions for 446 yards and a 18.6 average. Both were among the Top Eight in top average stats for games through October 19. Iowa State's Lane Danielsen has been among Big 12 leaders throughout the season in total receptions and yards per game and has 33 catches for 616 yards and a 18.7 average to rank among the national norm toppers in per-catch stats. The ISU standout also is a semifinalist for the prestigious Fred Biletnikoff Award.

Oklahoma State All-America candidate and Biletnikoff semifinalist Rashaun Woods is No. 4 nationally this week with 8.1 catches per game (57 for 810 yards) and tops in the country in receiving yards per game with 115.7. Missouri WR Justin Gage broke both the Big 12 career pass catches' and receiving yards' marks last week with his 176<sup>th</sup> reception (he had four catches for 77 yards in a 36-12 win over Kansas) and with 2,400 career yards for the Tigers, and Texas Tech redshirt freshman RB Taurean Henderson has the best first-year receiving totals of any youngster in Division I-A with 64 catches for 331 yards, two TD and 7.1 receptions per contest.

### Three Big 12ers Among Top 17 in CoSIDA Academic All-America Rankings

Nebraska remains atop the all-time choices for all sports in the Verizon College Sports Information Directors of America Academic All-America first units in research by Millsport of Stamford, Conn. The Academic All-America awards were originated in 1952 by SMU publicist Lester Jordan to recognize combined classroom and academic performances.

The Huskers have 196 first team selections since the 1952-53 academic year while the Notre Dame Fighting Irish are second with 145. Texas (10<sup>th</sup> with 70 first teamers) and Kansas (tied for 17<sup>th</sup> with 59) join NU among the prestigious Top 20. The breakdown by conferences among the elite include Big 12 with three, Big East with one, Big Ten with five, ECAC with one, Mid-American with one, Pacific-10 with two, Patriot with one, Southeastern with two, and three independents or non-DI teams.

NU has been assisted greatly in national leadership by a total of 58 first team Verizon CoSIDA Academic All-America choices since end James Huge (1962) initially was selected as first team.

**ISU's Wallace Joins Semifinalists for Unitas Golden Arm Award**

Iowa State quarterback Seneca Wallace was selected on Oct. 23s one of five finalists for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, presented to the nation's top senior college quarterback. Wallace has also accepted invitations to play in a trio of postseason all-star games. The other Unitas finalists are Byron Leftwich of Marshall, Ken Dorsey of Miami, Carson Palmer of Southern California and Dave Ragone of Louisville. Wallace has hit on 148-of-253 passes for 2,070 yards and 12 TD. The award is named for the Hall of Fame quarterback who played at Louisville before his 18-year NFL career. Unitas died Sept. 11, 2002. The winner will be announced Dec. 4. David Carr of Fresno State, who was later taken first overall in the NFL draft by the Houston Texans, won the award last year. Wallace, who had already accepted an invitation to play in the postseason East-West Shrine game Jan. 11, 2003, in San Francisco, Calif., also last week accepted invitations to play in the Hula Bowl and Senior Bowl. The Senior Bowl will be played Jan. 18 in Mobile, Ala. The Hula Bowl will be Feb. 1 in Kahului, Maui, Hawai'i.

**Defenders. Scholar-Athletes Reaping Rewards, Too**

Oklahoma defensive end Jimmy Wilkerson and Texas DE Cory Redding have been named as two of the 10 semifinalists for the inaugural Ted Hendricks College Defensive End of the Year Award. On-field performance, leadership abilities and contributions to university and community are some of the criteria used in the selection process. It is sponsored by the Miami (Fla.) Touchdown Club, formed in 1959, and a panel of 40 coaches, national media and college media relations directors forms the voting body. This trio composed half the total of six NCAA Division I-A designees for 2002 in recent selections by the NFF College Hall of Fame. Eligibility requirements included being a senior or graduate in his final year of eligibility, a grade point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale, superior academic application/performance, outstanding athletics' ability as a first team student-athlete, strong leadership, and citizenship.

### Careers to Remember: Kingsbury, Griffin, Simms, Gage, Woods, Among Others, All Climbing

Texas Tech senior QB Kliff Kingsbury became the third standout in NCAA Division I-A history to register 10,000 yards of career total offense, 10,000 passing yards and 1,000 completions (he currently has a national record 1,074) this year, but he is joined by over a dozen fellow juniors and seniors climbing several Big 12 career ladders. Oklahoma RB Quentin Griffin appears in three categories while Texas senior QB Chris Simms has a chance to finish in Top Five Big 12 all-time passing, total offense, completions, and touchdowns' categories. Missouri's aforementioned Gage and Oklahoma State's Woods have combined for 342 career receptions (176, 166) to form the best 1-2 "punch" in an active season in league annals. Baylor veteran Reggie Newhouse (fourth in receiving yards and fifth in career catches) joins national rushing leader Chris Brown (162.9 yards rushing per game, second-fastest CU rusher ever to reach 2,000 yards) among the rising stars as well. Biletnikoff Award semifinalist Roy Williams of Texas also is within striking range of Top Five conference recognition in catches, yards and TD. Nebraska kicker Josh Brown added eight points to his vita in a 38-31 win at Texas A&M last weekend to raise his career numbers to 274 points—26 away from becoming the Big 12's fifth 300-point scorer and six on the all-time list.

#### Buffaloes, Sooners Ready for Dec. 7, Too?

Colorado, which has been 11-1 in its last 12 Big 12 Conference contests and not even counting a 39-37 win over Texas in the 2002 Dr Pepper Big 12 Football Championship at Irving's Texas Stadium, treks to Norman, Okla., for the most vital league game to date against Big 12 South Division leader Oklahoma (7-0, 3-0 Big 12, 2<sup>nd</sup> in both Associated Press and ESPN/USA TODAY polls). The Buffs leapt from 20<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> in the current ESPN/USA TODAY national survey and from 21<sup>st</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> in AP after starting the 2002 campaign at 6-2 and 4-0 in the league. The 2:30 p.m. (CST) ABC regional telecast includes possible overtones for the Dec. 7 Dr Pepper Big 12 Football Championship at Houston's Reliant Stadium. Oklahoma won the 2000 Big 12 and national titles after edging Kansas State 27-24 in the Dr Pepper Big 12 title game at Kansas City before the Buffaloes capped their first Big 12 crown last December.

#### Scoring and Defending

CU's 37-point outburst against Big 12 South contender Texas Tech in a 37-13 Buffaloes' home win gives the Big 12 eight teams with 30 points per game. That's a high for the league at this stage of the season, and Nebraska and Oklahoma State are just percentage points away from that mark with scoring norms of 29.4 and 29.3, respectively. The eight 30-plus league juggernauts are all among the Top 45 nationally, and Kansas State (with the nation's third-highest touchdowns' total at 46 in eight games) is fourth nationally with a 42.4 average. Oklahoma holds down the No. 5 position with 41.1 points per outing while Texas Tech is 14<sup>th</sup> with 34.9. Texas A&M came within nine points of scoring four points in four consecutive games for the first time since 1941 while Iowa State is on track for a possible season's scoring mark with 32.4 ppg.

If it seems that Big 12 teams are not playing a great deal of defense, one can check the NCAA scoring defense ledgers. Oklahoma, Texas and Kansas State are 2-3-4 nationally with average allowances of 13.1, 13.2 and 13.4 points each contest, in that order, while Texas A&M stands 16<sup>th</sup> at 17.9 with 86 of the Aggies' 143 total points surrendered coming from Texas Tech (48) and Nebraska (38).

Kansas State held Baylor to a NCAA-fewest -37 yards rushing last Saturday in Waco to improve the Wildcats' rushing defense to No. 4 in the country at 76.6 yards per game.

Nebraska used a trio of rushers (QB Jammal Lord with 159, IB David Home with 128 and IB Dahrran Diedrick combined for 372 of the Huskers' 381 net rushing yards at Texas A&M to help NU keep its No. 4 rating in team rushing offense at 279.1 yards per tilt.

Missouri also maintained its high standing of 25<sup>th</sup> in NCAA Division I-A total offense behind the running of TB T.J. Leon with a career-high 104 yards rushing on 17 carries with two TD against Kansas while replacing the injured Zack Abron. Freshman QB Brad Smith continues to dazzle foes with 15 rushing attempts for 117 yards and 135 net yards passing. Smith, seventh in national individual total offense with 295.6 yards per game, accounts personally for 72 percent of the Tigers' 412.1 team total offense yards each contest. Mizzou and Smith are both No. 2 in conference standings in total offense production.

Texas, meanwhile, is enjoying one of its top overall defensive performances since the mid-1980s with the nation's No. 3 pass defense at 133.4 yards per game and the No. 3 total defense with 258.9 yards allowed behind No. 2 Oklahoma with a 252.3 weekly defensive allowance. Longhorns' soph RB standout Cedric Benson leads the team and is 18<sup>th</sup> nationally with 934 net rushing yards (78 percent of his team's 1,196 total net rushing yards) and a likely second consecutive 1,000-yard rushing season.

## ***“Home on the Range”***

Nebraska and Texas, who tangle Saturday at 6 p.m. (CST) in a national telecast from Lincoln on Fox Sports Net, remain 1-3 nationally in current home winning streaks. The Longhorns are 25-2 in their last 27 home games while the Huskers have a 50-1 mark at Memorial Stadium/Tom Osborne Field since the 1995 season and the lone loss coming to Texas 20-16 on Oct. 31, 1998. Texas, with its longest string of wins (17) at Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium since the 1982-84 seasons, is in fourth with its current streak. OU had then-best (2000-01) football winning streak ended at 20 by the Huskers in '01 20-10 at Lincoln, and that was the 51st-longest (tied with 10 other teams) overall winning skein in NCAA Division I-A members' history. The Sooners still have the NCAA D-IA all-time winning streak mark with 47 before falling to Notre Dame 7-0. On Oct. 5, 2002, Washington had its 17-game home winning streak ended by Pac-10 rival California 30-27. Oklahoma also had the nation's then-second-longest home winning skein end at 19 games (1999-2001) on Nov. 24, 2001, after a 16-13 loss to Oklahoma State in Norman.

In a related note, Big 12 schools have been extra-tough to down at home in 2002 with a 41-14 record to date. Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech carry the “road warrior” torches with nine (three apiece) of the 17 actual victories on hostile ground this year. Tech also has played six road encounters in its first nine games before returning home to tangle with Baylor Saturday. Kansas State with a 44-10 win at Baylor and NU's 38-31 triumph over Texas A&M in College Station gave Big 12 home units a 3-2 record last weekend.

### ***Scoring Streaks; Three Schools Add to School Records Every Time on Field***

Three Big 12 schools opened the season with school-record streaks without being shut out, and Nebraska avenged its most recent blanking in 1996 with a 48-10 opening win over Arizona State (a 19-0 victor over the Huskers in 1996 at Tempe, Ariz., to stop a school-record 231-game scoring streak; the Huskers have scored in 311 of their last 312 games). The Texas Longhorns (261 consecutive games with points) trail only NCAA record-setting Brigham Young (currently 344 games) among active Division I-A teams without shutouts, and those are the two skeins in NCAA Division I-A history. Texas' last shutout was by Baylor 22 years ago while Colorado has gone 14 seasons without a blanking. ISU has not been held scoreless in a game since 1991. Texas Tech's defense ended a 13-year regular-season scoring streak for Texas A&M by edging the Aggies 12-0 on Nov. 3, 2001, and then the teams combined for 95 points in their 2002 renewal at College Station—a 48-47 Red Raiders' win in overtime. In the “No Place like Home” department, 11 of the most recent shutouts against Big 12 schools have come in road contests, and 11 current shutout skeins were administered by conference members.

## AROUND THE BIG 12

### BAYLOR

The Bears suffered a 44-10 loss to No. 20 Kansas State in Waco...Baylor (3-5, 1-3) lost its third straight game but scored for the first time in that stretch...BU had gone almost 139 minutes over nine-plus quarters without scoring until senior Daniel Andino kicked a 34-yard field goal in the second quarter to tie the score at three...Junior quarterback Josh Zachry, who started in place of injured Aaron Karas, completed 17-of-24 passes for 248 yards...Zachry was knocked woozy in the third quarter and did not return...Senior Greg Cicero finished the game for the Bears throwing for 90 yards (7-of-13)...Senior wide receiver Reggie Newhouse had nine catches for 173 yards for the Bears to raise his career total to 157 receptions for 2,186 (both in Big 12 career Top Five)...Junior defensive back Derrick Cash and senior linebacker Greg Wade each recorded eight tackles in the loss.

### COLORADO

The No. 21 Buffaloes beat Texas Tech 37-13 in a matchup televised regionally by Fox Sports Net...This is Colorado's second 4-0 start in Big 12 Conference history (seven seasons) and its first since the 1996 team opened 7-0...Junior tailback Chris Brown (26-for-149 and one touchdown) reeled off his fifth consecutive 100-yard game, the most in a row at CU since 1994, when Rashaan Salaam closed out the regular season with nine straight...Senior inside linebacker/strong safety Kory Mossoni made his second career interception in the first quarter, returning it 41 yards to set up CU's first touchdown...Senior defensive tackle Tyler Brayton returned his first fumble recovery of the year (second career) for a touchdown—his first points of his career...Senior cornerback Roderick Sneed had two kickoff returns for 110 yards and upped his season average to 35.1 on eight returns.

### IOWASTATE

The Cyclones fell to Texas 21-10 and suffered their second straight loss in Big 12 play...The matchup was televised nationally by ABC...ISU is now 0-4 all-time against Texas...Junior wide receiver Lane Danielsen had four catches for 55 yards, which gives him 87 catches for 1,461 yards in his career...Junior place kicker Adam Benike booted a career-best 40-yard field goal in the second quarter...Senior quarterback Seneca Wallace's second-quarter touchdown pass to Lance Young was the 23rd of his career, and he is tied for fifth all-time with David Archer (1982-83)...Wallace has 2,070 passing yards this season and 4,114 for his career, placing him sixth and fourth all-time, respectively...Junior running back JaMaine Billups recorded his career-first interception in the second quarter...Billups also had nine tackles (five solo) for the Cyclones.

### KANSAS

The Jayhawks fell to rival Missouri 36-12 in Columbia...The Kansas-Missouri Border War series – the second-oldest in the country and the oldest series west of the Mississippi River – now stands tied at 51-51-9...KU drops to 0-5 in the Big 12 for the first time since 1998...Senior wide receiver Byron Gasaway tallied a career-high six catches for a career-high 101 yards on the day...Gasaway's 101 receiving yards are the most by any Kansas receiver since Harrison Hill had 114 yards versus Kansas on Oct. 7, 2000...Junior quarterback Bill Whittemore (19-of-37 passes for 248 yards) recorded two touchdown passes in the game and took over sole possession of the KU single-game touchdowns responsible record with 22...Whittemore also tied the KU record for most

consecutive games throwing a touchdown pass...He has now tossed a touchdown pass in six straight games.

### KANSAS STATE

The Wildcats posted a 44-10 win over Baylor in Waco, Texas...Sophomore running back Darren Sproles ran for 124 yards and a touchdown...Sproles is the first Kansas State running back in 29 years with four straight 100-yard games...The only KSU runner with more than four in a row is Isaac Jackson, who had six straight in 1973...Senior defensive back Terence Newman picked off his fourth pass of the season and ninth interception of his career...Redshirt freshman defensive back Jesse Tetuan had a 34-yard interception return for a touchdown with four minutes left in the first half...Junior defensive end Andrew Shull blocked Baylor kicker Daniel Andino's 22-yard attempt...The blocked field goal was picked up by and returned 93 yards by junior defensive back Randy Jordan...Junior quarterback Ell Roberson ran for 90 yards on 11 carries, and was 7-of-17 passing for 54 yards.

### MISSOURI

The Tigers beat rival Kansas 36-12 in Columbia...The Missouri-Kansas Border War series – the second-oldest in the country and the oldest series west of the Mississippi River – now stands tied at 51-51-9...Redshirt freshman Brad Smith ran for 117 yards, including a career-long 75-yard touchdown run in the third quarter...Smith finished with 117 yards rushing on 15 carries, and was 9-of-16 passing for 135 yards and two touchdowns...Senior wide receiver Justin Gage caught four passes for 77 yards...Gage's 62-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter set a MU career record for touchdown catches...Gage's 12-yard reception in the second quarter put him past Texas' Kwame Cavil as the Big 12 Conference's all-time leader in receptions. Cavil had 174 receptions at UT from 1997-99...Gage finished with four receptions for 77 yards and one touchdown.

### NEBRASKA

Nebraska rallied for a 38-31 win over Texas A&M in College Station, Texas...The win ended a five-game road losing streak and was NU's first road victory since 51-7 win at Kansas on Nov. 3, 2001...Freshman I-back David Horne rushed 24 times for 128 yards and four touchdowns...The last time a Husker had four rushing touchdowns in a game was Eric Crouch versus Kansas in 2001 (also vs. Iowa State in 2001)...The four rushing touchdowns are the most ever against A&M... Junior quarterback Jamaal Lord rushed for 159 yards – his fourth 100-yard game of the season – and became the 52<sup>nd</sup> Husker to rush for 1,000 career-yards...With 30 carries, Lord also broke the single-game record for rushing attempts by a quarterback...The previous record was 27 by Eric Crouch versus Kansas State in 1999.

### OKLAHOMA

After an idle week, the Big 12 South-leading Sooners will face Big 12 North-leading Colorado this Saturday in Norman...The matchup will be televised regionally by ABC at 2:30 p.m. (CST)... Under Bob Stoops, OU is 10-1 when it has more than the standard six days to prepare for a game – that includes season openers, bye weeks and bowls...The lone exception was the 1999 Independence Bowl in which Mississippi defeated Oklahoma, 27-25...The average margin of victory in the 10 victories was 23.2 points...Last week Oklahoma defeated Iowa State 49-3 at Owen Field...CU comes

off a 37-13 win over Texas Tech...The Sooners' lead the all-time series 34-16-2.

### OKLAHOMA STATE

Oklahoma State will face Texas A&M this Saturday in a contest to be televised on Fox Sports Net Regional...This marks the fourth time this season an OSU football game will be televised...The Cowboys and the Aggies have met 17 times on the gridiron with A&M holding a 13-4 advantage in the series...In the last meeting, Oklahoma State was defeated 21-7 in College Station...Last week OSU posted a 24-21 victory over Nebraska to move to 3-4 overall and 1-2 in the Big 12...The Aggies (6-3, 2-2 Big 12) come off a 37-13 loss to Texas Tech...Biletnikoff Award semifinalist wide receiver Rashaun Woods is fourth nationally with 8.1 receptions per game and has 57 catches for 810 yards on the season.

### TEXAS

The No. 7 Longhorns downed Iowa State 21-10 in front of the 13th-largest crowd in UT history (83,071) at Darrell K. Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium...The contest was televised nationally by ABC...The win assured head coach Mack Brown of his 13th consecutive winning season and qualified him for his 11th straight bowl game...Sophomore running back Cedric Benson ran for 199 yards and two touchdowns on 30 carries...Senior quarterback Chris Simms picked up his 22nd career victory as a starter, tying Major Applewhite (1998-2001) for fifth place on UT's quarterback victories list...Simms is 22-5 (.815) as a starter and had 130 yards of total offense on the day, to give him 5,473 for his career and moving him into fifth place on UT's career total offense chart...Junior wide receiver Roy Williams had 48 receiving yards to top the 2,000-yard plateau for his career (2,046).

### TEXASA&M

The Aggies suffered a 38-31 home-loss to Nebraska...Sophomore quarterback Dustin Long completed 20 of 37 passes for 269 yards and two touchdowns, his fourth 200+ passing effort in his last five games...Sophomore defensive back Byron Jones returned a fumble 66 yards for a third quarter touchdown...For the season, Jones has five takeaways for 184 yards (4 interceptions for 117 yards) and two touchdowns...Senior wide receiver Bethel Johnson had three receptions for 28 yards, moving him into third on A&M's career receptions chart with 100...The school record is 110 by Keith Woodside (1984-87)...Johnson's 1,485 career receiving yards also ranks third in school annals...Redshirt freshman defensive back Jaxon Appel recorded 13 tackles (four solo) in the loss.

### TEXASTECH

The Red Raiders were defeated by No. 21 Colorado 37-13 in Boulder, Colo. in a matchup that was televised regionally by Fox Sports Net...The game marked the fifth meeting in the series between the two schools...Texas Tech now trails the series 2-3...Senior quarterback Kliff Kingsbury, the nation's leader in completions, attempts, yards passing and touchdown passes, was 36-for-65 for 268 yards and no touchdowns...Tech attempted 65 passes, the most ever against CU (old record was 64 by Texas A&M in 1996)...TTU's 36 completions were the second-most against the Buffs (Fresno State has the most-37 in the '93 Aloha Bowl)...Redshirt freshman running back Taurean Henderson ran for 83 yards on 16 carries...Henderson also caught 11 passes for 41 yards...Junior wide receiver Carlos Francis caught seven passes for 63 yards.
