Huskers Travel to Kansas State to Take on Nationally Ranked Wildcats

Nebraska (7-4, 3-3) will look to ensure its 41st consecutive winning campaign on Saturday when it travels to Manhattan, Kan., to take on nationally ranked Kansas State. The Huskers became eligible for a 34th consecutive bowl trip with last Saturday's 45-7 win over Kansas and also locked up a 41st straight non-losing campaign. However, the Huskers will need to pick up an eighth victory to guarantee an above .500 season and need two victories to extend their streak of nine-win seasons to 34 years.

The Huskers face a tall order in Saturday's game at Manhattan. The Wildcats enter the game with an 8-2 record, including a 4-2 mark in the Big 12 Conference after a 58-7 victory over Iowa State on Saturday night in Manhattan. Kansas State is ranked 11th in both polls this week and still has hopes of capturing the North Division crown. The Wildcats lone setbacks this season have come on the road against Big 12 North leader Colorado and at home against No. 4 Texas. The Wildcats feature one of the nation's top defenses, ranking in the top 10 in all four major defensive statistical categories.

Nebraska holds a decided advantage in the all-time series between the two schools, holding a 72-12-2 edge in the series. However, in recent years the NU-Wildcat matchup has been one of the top showdowns in the Big 12 Conference. The teams have split the past four meetings in the series, with each school winning a pair of home games. Kansas State defeated the Huskers, 40-30, in Manhattan four seasons ago, ending NU's 29-game winning streak in the series and upended Nebraska, 29-28, in 2000 in the Huskers' last visit to Manhattan.

Game time for Saturday's matchup is set for 11:39 a.m. at a sold-out KSU Stadium. The contest will be televised on Fox Sports Net.

Nebraska Extends Winning Streak over Kansas to 34 Games

Nebraska added to one of the nation's most lopsided college football matchups, defeating Kansas, 45-7 last Saturday at Memorial Stadium. The victory was the Huskers' 34th straight in the series, the second-longest active winning streak against an opponent in college football. In the process, Nebraska also picked up a win on Homecoming for the 34th straight season.

The Huskers wasted little time establishing their dominance. On its first offensive possession, NU drove 81 yards in six plays, capped by Dahrran Diedrick's 53-yard touchdown run, to take a 7-0 lead. Kansas struck back quickly with a 50-yard touchdown pass from Jonas Weatherbie to Byron Gasaway to even the game at 7-7. However, Kansas would not score again and the Husker ground game and defense took control of the remainder of the game.

Freshman I-back David Horne put together two straight 30-yard runs on a drive midway through the second quarter to give NU a 14-7 edge. Early in the second quarter, DeJuan Groce put Nebraska in great field position with a 24-yard punt return, and Nebraska drove 47 yards in seven plays to take a two-touchdown advantage. Jammal Lord capped the drive with a 27-yard touchdown pass to Wilson Thomas. A breakdown in the Kansas punting game once again gave the Huskers a short field. This time the Huskers drove inside the KU 10-yard line, but settled for a 27-yard Josh Brown field goal to give NU a 24-7 lead, an advantage it would carry into halftime.

Nebraska opened the second half with a five-play, 80-yard scoring drive to build a 31-7 lead. Lord threw his second TD pass of the afternoon, a 12-yarder to Aaron Golliday, to cap the drive. Nebraska quickly added to its lead courtesy of the special teams. Lannie Hopkins blocked his second punt of the day, and senior rover Aaron Terpening returned the ball 30 yards for a score for a 38-7 lead.

Reserve quarterback Mike Stuntz guided the Huskers to another third-quarter score, capped by Josh Davis' four-yard touchdown run to account for the final margin. Nebraska substituted freely throughout the second half, with a season-high 111 players seeing action in the ball game. The Huskers relied on their running game, topping 300 yards for the fifth time in the past six games with 352 rushing yards. Both Horne (122) and Diedrick (107) topped 100 yards on the ground, marking the first time this season a pair of Husker running backs eclipsed the century mark. After the early touchdown, the Blackshirt defense kept Kansas in check, allowing just 224 total yards, including 71 yards rushing.

Recapping Game 11...Nebraska 45, Kansas 7

▶ The victory was Nebraska's 34th straight win in the series, dating back to 1968, and the Huskers' 16th straight win over Kansas in Lincoln. Nebraska also picked up a win on Homecoming for the 34th straight season.

▶ Quarterback **Jammal Lord** became the 18th quarterback in Division I-A history to both rush and pass for more than 1,000 yards in the same season. Lord reached the milestone with a seven-yard pass to Josh Davis in the second quarter. Lord joined former NU quarterbacks Scott Frost (1997) and Eric Crouch (2001) in accomplishing the feat. Lord now has 2,245 yards of total offense this season, the fifth-best mark in school history and upped his season rushing total to 1,229 yards, the 11th-best season in NU history. Lord passed for two touchdowns for the second straight week.

▶ Nebraska piled up 352 yards rushing against Kansas. It marked the third straight game and fifth time in its last six outings that the NU offense had topped 300 yards on the ground.

▶ Senior I-back **Dahrran Diedrick** rushed 12 times for a season-best 107 yards, his first 100-yard game of the season and eighth in his career. Diedrick opened the scoring with a career-long 53-yard run for a score in the first quarter. With his 107 yards, Diedrick moved up to ninth place on NU's career rushing list with 2,543 yards.

▶ Freshman I-back **David Horne** gave the Huskers a pair of backs over the century mark with 122 yards on just nine attempts, an average of 13.6 yards per carry. Horne had three carries of 25 yards or more and picked up his third 100-yard day in the past four games. Horne now has 556 yards rushing, the fifth-best season by an NU frosh.

▶ Tight end **Aaron Golliday** caught a 12-yard touchdown pass, his second TD of the year. Nebraska's tight ends have combined for five TD receptions in 2002.

▶ Senior split end **Wilson Thomas** caught two passes for 40 yards, including a 27-yard touchdown catch in the second quarter. Thomas now has 63 career receptions, good for ninth place on the NU chart.

▶ Freshman cornerback **Fabian Washington** had an outstanding afternoon with a pair of pass breakups and his fourth interception of the season. Washington's 11 PBU lead the Huskers and the total is just one off the freshman PBU record of 12, held by Ralph Brown (1996).

▶ Sophomore rover **Lannie Hopkins** blocked a pair of Kansas punts, giving him three blocks this season. The second block of the day was returned 30 yards by **Aaron Terpening** for a touchdown. Hopkins was named Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week.

▶ Senior **DeJuan Groce** returned five punts for 61 yards and moved into second place on the Husker season punt return yards list with 586, just 30 behind Johnny Rodgers' school record set in his Heisman winning season of 1972.

▶ Punter **Kyle Larson** averaged 50.2 yards on six punts and pinned KU inside its own 20 two times, including one on the Jayhawk 1-yard line.

▶ Senior wingback **Troy Hassebroek** was named Homecoming king, the first time a Husker football player has been named king since a king has been chosen (since 1975).

NU-Wildcat Series Notes

- ▶ Nebraska will be looking to avoid a third straight loss in Manhattan. The Huskers have not lost three straight games at a league opponent's stadium since dropping four straight games vs. Oklahoma in Norman from 1973 to 1979.
- ▶ This year's meeting marks the ninth time in 10 seasons that Kansas State has entered the game nationally ranked in at least one poll. The Wildcats had been ranked in just one of the series' first 77 games before 1993.
- ▶ Nebraska is not ranked entering Saturday's game. The Huskers had been ranked in each of the past 33 meetings with Kansas State dating back to the 1968 game in Lincoln.
- ▶ Kansas State has been ranked higher than Nebraska just three times in the history of the series, all in the past five years.
- ▶ Nebraska has scored 28 or more points in eight of its last nine trips to Manhattan, including five straight 40-plus outings from 1981 to 1990.

Huskers from Kansas

- ▶ Four Huskers hail from the Sunflower State, including senior split end Ben Cornelsen (Shawnee). The others are walk-ons Phillip Kniep (Belleville), Tim Weltmer (Smith Center) and Peter Atha (Topeka).

Scouting No. 11 Kansas State (8-2, 4-2)



Kansas State comes into Saturday's matchup with the Huskers with an 8-2 overall record and a 4-2 mark in Big 12 Conference play. The Wildcats are ranked 11th in both of this week's polls. Kansas State is coming off a dominant 58-7 victory over 21st-ranked Iowa State on Saturday night in Manhattan. Both of KSU's losses this season have come against ranked opponents, including a 35-31 loss at North Division leader Colorado and a 17-14 setback against No. 4 Texas in Manhattan.

Offensively, Kansas State is averaging 400.0 yards per game, powered by a strong running game. The Wildcats average 253.1 yards per game on the ground, second only to Nebraska among conference schools and fifth in the nation. K-State also passes for 146.9 yards per game and ranks second nationally in scoring at 46.1 points per game. The Wildcat offense is led by junior quarterback Ell Roberson, who has accounted for nearly 1,700 yards of total offense this season. Roberson has rushed for 670 yards and 10 touchdowns, while completing 54 percent of his passes for 1,029 yards and five touchdowns against just three interceptions. Running back Darren Sproles is Kansas State's leading rusher with 1,072 yards and averages better than six yards per carry, while scoring 12 touchdowns. Taco Wallace is the Wildcats' leading receiver, pulling down 34 receptions and averaging 16.8 yards per catch.

On defense KSU is once again among the nation's stingiest units. The Wildcats rank among the top 10 in the country in all four major statistical categories, including first in the nation in scoring defense (11.4 ppg). The 'Cats rank third in rush defense (72.5 ypg), fourth in total defense (250.5 ypg) and are eighth in pass efficiency defense with a 93.0 rating. Linebackers Josh Buhl and Terry Pierce lead KSU's defensive effort. Buhl is the team's leading tackler with 113 stops, including 65 unassisted tackles and nine tackles for loss this season. Pierce has added 85 tackles, including 12 TFL and five sacks. Cornerback Terrence Newman is a Thorpe Award semifinalist and has four interceptions and 11 pass breakups in 2002. He averages better 15.7 yards per punt return and 32.4 yards on kickoff returns.

Kansas State Coach Bill Snyder

Bill Snyder is in his 14th season as the head coach at Kansas State and has compiled a 113-51-1 record in Manhattan. Snyder has guided the Wildcats to nine straight bowl games and eight seasons with nine or more victories in addition to a pair of Big 12 North Division crowns. Snyder is 2-11 against Nebraska, 2-3 against the Huskers in Manhattan.

Nebraska-Kansas State Series...NU leads 72-12-2

Nebraska holds a 60-game lead in the all-time series between the two schools. The past four meetings have been split at two games apiece, with the home team victorious in each of those games.

Before Kansas State's 40-30 victory in 1998 in Manhattan, Nebraska had won 29 straight games in the series and 17 straight meetings at Kansas State. Nebraska holds a 32-5-2 advantage in games played in Manhattan, including a 13-2 edge at KSU Stadium.

In last year's meeting in Lincoln, second-ranked Nebraska used a decided advantage in special teams and defense to post a 31-21 victory against the Wildcats. Quarterback Eric Crouch opened the scoring with a 14-yard TD run in the second quarter, before cornerback Willie Amos gave NU a 13-0 lead with an interception return for a touchdown. Kansas State responded with two second-quarter TDs to lead 14-13 at intermission. However, Dahrran Diedrick scored on a two-yard TD midway through the third period and DeJuan Groce sealed the victory with a 60-yard punt return for a touchdown. Diedrick (108) and Crouch (106) paced a Husker rushing attack that gained 264 yards, while K-State's Ell Roberson rushed for 119 yards and the Wildcats rushed for 239 yards as a team, but completed just 4-of-18 passes and were intercepted three times.

Nebraska Head Coach Frank Solich

Coach Frank Solich (Nebraska, 1966) is in his fifth season at the helm of the Husker program with a 49-13 school and career record (.790). With 11 wins in 2001, Solich moved into a tie for fourth on the all-time Division I list for victories in the first four seasons as a head coach. He will officially qualify to rank among his peers after this season with five years as a head coach, and with a .790 winning percentage, would rank third among active coaches in Division I-A.



Coach Solich became just the third first-year Nebraska head coach to record nine wins in his first season at the helm, joining a pair of Hall of Fame Coaches—Tom Osborne (9-2-1 in 1973) and Bob Devaney (9-2 in 1962). Solich posted a 9-4 record in his first season, despite being hit heavy with injuries. He posted the best record of any Husker second-year coach as his team posted a 12-1 record in 1999, leading NU to a Big 12 championship and No. 2 (coaches poll) and No. 3 (AP poll) final national rankings. Solich's 21 wins in his first two years at NU bettered Devaney's previous school record of 19 and ranked in a tie for third all time among Division I coaches in their first two years at the helm. He went 10-2 in 2000 and his 31 wins in three years bettered both Osborne and Devaney's 28 wins in their first three years. His 42 wins in four years is also a school best and his 49 wins in his first five years is tied for the fourth-most in Division I-A history.

Solich is the only Husker coach to have won 12 games in either of his first two seasons. Devaney won nine games in his first year, 10 his second year, nine in his third and 10 in his fourth, while Osborne won nine, nine, 10 and nine, respectively. Devaney won his first conference title his second year, while Osborne tied for his first title in his third year at the helm. Solich was named the 1999 Big 12 Coach of the Year by his league peers and the AP after winning the league championship in 1999, and was named coach of the year by the conference coaches a second time in 2001.

Husker Staff Boasts 152 Years of Combined Experience at Nebraska

Nebraska has long been known for the continuity of its coaching staff and that has not changed under Frank Solich's direction. Since taking over the program, Solich has replaced just one assistant, defensive coordinator Charlie McBride, who retired after the 1999 season.

Including this season, Nebraska's staff owns 152 years of combined experience in Lincoln and remarkably 142 combined bowl games--or every year possible.

the first Husker running back to rush for 200 yards in a game and remains the only fullback to accomplish that feat. He also lettered for the NU baseball team in 1965. After serving as a local high school football coach for 14 years, Solich took over the NU freshman program and posted a 19-1 record from 1979 to 1982. He was elevated to NU's running backs coach after four seasons, a position he held for 15 years (1983-97). He was promoted to assistant head coach in 1991 and head coach following the 1997 season. Solich earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from NU in 1966 and 1972, respectively.

Coaches' Game Day Assignments

Following the lead of Tom Osborne, Coach Solich is his own offensive coordinator, calling the plays from the sideline. Craig Bohl, who tutors the linebackers and is in his third season as defensive coordinator is also on the sideline, along with receivers coach Ron Brown, quarterbacks coach Turner Gill, defensive line coach Jeff Jamrog and kickers/offensive line coach Dan Young. Running backs coach Dave Gillespie moved to the sideline for NU's win at Texas A&M, after being in the press box for the first eight games. Assisting from the press box are rush ends coach Nelson Barnes, defensive backs coach George Darlington and offensive line coach Milt Tenopir.

Surging Husker Running Game to Face Stern Test at K-State

Nebraska's running game has been back to its usual self in recent weeks. The Huskers were held to just 81 yards on the ground at Iowa State in late September, but since that game the NU ground game has been nearly unstoppable, averaging 346.8 yards per game in six contests.

The run of rushing success will be put to the test this week against a Kansas State defense that ranks third nationally against the run, allowing just 72.5 yards per game. The Wildcats have limited five opponents to less than 50 yards on the ground and have given up just five rushing touchdowns. Colorado ran for 194 yards in a 35-31 victory over K-State, the most rushing yards the Wildcats have allowed in 2002.

Nebraska is coming off a 352-yard rushing effort against Kansas. The victory marked the fifth time in the past six games the Huskers have cracked the 300-yard mark on the ground. I-backs David Horne (122) and Dahrran Diedrick (107) both topped 100 yards, and NU had six running plays of more than 25 yards. The Kansas game came on the heels of two impressive rushing performances against strong defenses.

The Huskers rolled up 320 yards rushings against No. 7 Texas, which boasted the nation's No. 3 defense entering the game. Husker quarterback Jammal Lord gouged the Longhorn defense for an NU quarterback record 234 rushing yards on 23 carries (10.2 ypc), and NU had five rushing plays of 20 yards or more in the game.

Nebraska had perhaps its most impressive rushing outing at Texas A&M. The Huskers ran for 381 yards on a season-high 73 rushing attempts and scored five TDs on the ground. The effort was especially remarkable when considering that the Aggies entered the game allowing just 76.9 yards per game on the ground and had not allowed an opponent to run for more than 129 yards in 2002. In fact, NU's 381 rushing yards were the most against Texas A&M in 32 seasons. Before facing the Husker ground game, A&M had not allowed a 100-yard rusher in 20 games, but a pair of Huskers topped that mark (Lord, 159; Horne, 128).

Nebraska has rushed for 259 yards or more in each of the last six games, including a season-high 444 yards vs. McNeese State to begin the stretch. For the season, Nebraska is averaging a Big 12-best 289.5 yards rushing per game to rank third in the nation, behind Air Force (299.5) and West Virginia (294.9).

Quarterback Jammal Lord and true freshman I-back David Horne have keyed Nebraska's rushing success in recent weeks. Lord has run for 856 yards in the last six games (142.7 ypg). He has posted the only two 200-yard days by a quarterback in NU history in the period with 218 yards vs. McNeese State and 234 yards against Texas. He also had 159 yards at Texas A&M on an NU quarterback record 30 carries. Horne shed his redshirt after the Iowa State game and has gained 556 yards (92.7 ypg), including three 100-yard performances.

Nebraska's five running plays of 25 yards or longer against Kansas, give the Huskers 23 such plays on the ground this season. Eighteen of those 23 long runs have come in Nebraska's past six games, after NU had just five running plays go for 25 yards or more in the first five games.

Husker O-Line Paving Way for Rushing Resurgence

Not to be forgotten in Nebraska's rushing success in recent weeks is the play of the Husker offensive line. The NU offensive front opened big holes against strong Texas A&M and Texas defenses and continued to stand out in a 45-7 win over Kansas.

Nebraska had a school-record 110 pancakes against Texas A&M, bettering the previous high of 101 vs. Baylor in 2000. Redshirt freshman offensive tackle Richie Incognito had 28 knock-down blocks against the Aggies, the second-highest total in school history, trailing only Toniau Fonoti's 32 against Texas Tech last season. Incognito leads Nebraska with 143 pancakes, including 81 in the past four games (three 20-plus games).

Incognito's pancake total is tied for fourth-best in school history and just 12 pancakes from second on the NU single-season chart.

Incognito was one of three Huskers with a team-high 10 pancakes against Kansas (also Wes Cody and Junior Tagoa'i). Incognito leads Nebraska with seven double-figure pancake games, while Center John Garrison has six such games and ranks second on the team in total pancakes with 116.

Five Husker offensive linemen had career-high pancake totals against A&M. In addition to Incognito, OT Dan Vili Waldrop's 24 pancakes were the fourth-highest total in school history, seven better than his previous career high of 17 vs. Rice in 2001. Garrison matched his career high with 20 pancakes. Erickson (16) and fellow guard Junior Tagoa'i (18) also bettered their previous best outings. Tagoa'i has four double-figure pancake efforts despite coming off the NU bench.

NU Run Defense Making Opponents One-Dimensional

Like the Husker offense, the Blackshirt defense has also begun to control the line of scrimmage in the past three games. Nebraska gave up 195 yards on the ground in a loss at Oklahoma State, but has since been very stingy against the run.

Nebraska has allowed its past three opponents to rush for just 67.7 yards per game and 2.1 yards per carry. NU has allowed just one rushing touchdown in that span. The Huskers limited Texas A&M to an opponent season-low 53 rushing yards, while Texas picked up just 79 yards on the ground, followed by Kansas' 71-yard effort last Saturday. The longest rush Nebraska has allowed in the three-game stretch is 20 yards.

The improved run defense has lowered Nebraska's rush defense average to 121.2 yards per game.

Lord Joins 1,000-1,000 Club Against Kansas

Nebraska junior quarterback Jammal Lord faced a variety of difficult challenges in his first season as the Huskers' starting signal caller. First, he was faced with the duty of following 2001 Heisman Trophy winner Eric Crouch, who started 38 games at quarterback from 1998 to 2001. Secondly, Lord guided a young Husker offense against ranked teams in his first two road contests at Penn State and Iowa State. While those games didn't go as Lord and the Huskers would have hoped, Lord has rebounded in strong fashion and is producing one of the top total offense seasons in school history.

Lord had a short day of work in Nebraska's 45-7 win over Kansas, playing just one series in the second half. However, Lord still managed to rush for 74 yards and passed for 59 yards and two touchdowns. His passing yards pushed his season total to 1,016 yards and entered Lord into an elite club. He has 1,229 rushing yards to go along with his passing total, making him the third Husker

quarterback in six seasons to both rush and pass for more than 1,000 yards in the same season, joining Scott Frost (1997) and Eric Crouch (2001). Lord is the 18th player in Division I-A history to accomplish the feat.

The 6-2, 220-pound Lord has produced 2,245 yards of total offense this season, the fifth-most in school history and the most ever by a Nebraska

junior. He needs 380 yards (190.0 ypg) in NU's final two games to break the single-season total offense record. Lord has already produced two of the top three single-game total offense marks in school history with an NU record 369 yards vs. McNeese State and 332 yards of total offense against Texas (third).

Lord began making his mark in the record book against McNeese State, posting his school-record total offense mark on just 35 total-offense attempts, good for a remarkable 10.5 yards per attempt. In that game he also rushed for a then-NU quarterback record 218 yards. Both of the broken records were set last season by Crouch (360 total offense yards at Colorado and 191 rushing yards at Missouri). The McNeese State game marked the first time that Lord topped 100 yards in both rushing and passing in the same contest. He reached the 100-100 mark for the second time at Texas A&M.

The quarterback rushing record set against McNeese State lasted all of four weeks, as Lord rushed for 234 yards on 23 carries against Texas and added 98 yards and a touchdown through the air. Lord's 234 rushing yards vs. Texas marked his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season. In addition to his two 200-yard outings, he also topped the century mark with 103 yards vs. Arizona State, 111 at Penn State and 159 yards at Texas A&M.

Lord's 159 yards at Texas A&M came on a Nebraska QB record 30 carries. In that game, Lord pushed both his career rushing and passing total past the 1,000-yard marks. He now has 1,442 career rushing yards to rank 33rd on the NU list and 1,197 passing, good for 20th on the Husker career chart.

During the Texas game, Lord broke the Nebraska season quarterback rushing record and is putting together one of the top rushing seasons in school history, regardless of position. Lord has 1,229 yards rushing in 2002, the 11th-best rushing season by a Husker. He is just three yards outside of the top 10 and has a chance of posting just the fifth, 1,500-yard rushing season in school history.

Lord has led the Huskers in rushing seven times in 2002. In addition to leading Nebraska in rushing yards (1,229) and rushing touchdowns (7), Lord averages a remarkable 6.4 yards per carry. By comparison, 2001 Heisman Trophy winner Eric Crouch averaged 5.5 yards per rush in 2001. Lord's 111.7 yards rushing per game rank 21st in the nation and third in the Big 12 Conference. Lord is second nationally in rushing among quarterbacks. His 204.1 total offensive yards per game rank seventh in the Big 12.

The McNeese State game was a career-best passing day for Lord in terms of completions (12), attempts (18), yards (151) and percentage (.667). He has topped 100 yards passing six times in 2002, including four of the past seven games, most recently when he threw for 116 yards at Texas A&M. Lord is completing 50 percent of his passes this season and has thrown for 10 touchdowns, including two in each of Nebraska's last two games.

Lord Supplies Nebraska With Big-Play Threat

One of the attributes Nebraska coaches saw in Jammal Lord from the start of the season was his big-play ability. The junior has not disappointed in that department this season, accounting for 20 plays of 25 yards or longer.

Lord has 11 rushes of 25 yards or more this season, including at least one in each of Nebraska's last six games. He has broke off six runs of 40 yards or longer, including four in the past three games. The NU signal caller has accounted for eight of NU's 10 longest runs of the season.

Against McNeese State, Lord had two TD runs of longer than 50 yards (56, 57) marking the first time a Husker has had two 50-plus yard scoring runs in a game since 1999.

Lord has connected on nine pass plays of 25 yards or more, including a 27-yard scoring strike to Wilson Thomas against Kansas. He hit a season-long 90-yard TD pass to Ross Pilkington at Iowa State, good for the third-longest pass play in NU history.

The 20 25-yard plays by Lord stack up well in comparison to 2001 Heisman winner Eric Crouch, who accounted for 24 plays of 25 yards or longer in 12 games last season (10 rush, 13 pass, 1 receiving).

Diedrick Climbs into Top 10 on NU Rushing List

Senior I-back Dahrran Diedrick posted his first 100-yard rushing day of the season with 107 yards on 12 carries against Kansas. He bolted 53 yards for a first-quarter touchdown to give NU a 7-0 lead, marking the longest run of his Husker career.

Diedrick's 107 yards against the Jayhawks moved him past five former Huskers and into ninth place on the NU career rushing list. Diedrick now has 2,543 career rushing yards, including 729 yards in 2002. Diedrick rushed for 85 yards on 15 carries against Texas A&M, including 78 yards on nine carries after halftime. Diedrick also scored a touchdown on a 12-yard run on NU's opening drive, one of six touchdowns

by Diedrick this season. He now has 26 rushing touchdowns in his career, the 14th-most in school history.

At 6-0 and 225 pounds, Diedrick supplies the Huskers with a physical running complement to freshman I-back David Horne who gives NU a home-run threat. Along with the I-back tandem, quarterback Jammal Lord gives NU one of the nation's most lethal three-player rushing threats.

Diedrick was a first-team All-Big 12 pick last season after leading the league in rushing with 1,299 yards. He also scored 15 touchdowns and rushed for 100 or more yards in seven of 11 regular-season appearances.

Going Around the Horne

I-back David Horne has given the Husker running game a kick-start since ending his redshirt season six games ago. Horne has rushed for 556 yards (92.7 ypg) and has raced for more than 100 yards three times in the past four weeks. Horne had 125 yards and a touchdown on 24 carries at Oklahoma State, a career-best 128 yards and four touchdowns vs. Texas A&M and 122 yards

touchdowns at Texas A&M were the most by a Husker freshman since fellow Omaha Central graduate Calvin Jones rushed for a school-record six TDs at Kansas in 1991 as a redshirt freshman. Horne and Diedrick both topped 100 yards against Kansas, the first time this season a pair of Husker running backs have cracked the century mark.

Horne's speed and field vision were evident immediately in his debut against McNeese State. He made a strong debut, rushing 12 times for 81 yards. He backed that performance up with 88 yards on a team-high 20 carries against Missouri, including 46 yards on a key second-quarter TD drive. He also added his first career TD on a five-yard run in the first quarter against Mizzou.

The 6-0, 190-pound Horne is averaging 5.8 yards per carry and his 92.7 yards per game would rank seventh in the Big 12 Conference if he had played in the required number of games. With 556 rushing yards, Horne ranks fifth on the NU single-season list for most rushing yards by a freshman.

Extra Special Teams

Like his predecessors Bob Devaney and Tom Osborne, NU Head Coach Frank Solich has stressed the importance of the Husker special teams. Entering the 2002 campaign, Solich has mentioned on numerous occasions that this year's kicking and coverage units had the potential to be very "special." The Husker special teams have played a key role in NU's success in 2002.

In Nebraska's season opener, the Huskers blocked two punts, one of which was returned for a touchdown, keying a 48-10 win over Arizona

State. The punt return unit stole the show against Troy State. Senior DeJuan Groce tied an NCAA record with two punt return touchdowns in NU's 31-16 victory. The special teams has remained solid throughout the season and again played a big role in the 24-13 victory over Missouri. Groce had his third punt return TD of the year and Josh Davis averaged nearly 28 yards on four kickoff returns. NU again blocked two punts against Kansas, returning one for a touchdown.

Here's a quick look at Nebraska's special teams dominance in 2002.

► **Punt Returns...**Nebraska ranks second in the nation in punt returns, averaging 18.0 yards on 38 punt returns this season. Groce has returned 30 punts for 586 yards, for a 19.5-yard average, good for second in the nation. Groce's two punt return touchdowns vs. Troy State not only set a school record, but matched the NCAA record. His 89-yard TD return against Missouri was his third of the season and the third-longest punt return in school history. It also tied the NU school record for punt return TDs in a season, matching Johnny Rodgers' three in 1971. His 155 yards on two returns against Troy State was just 15 yards shy of the school record for punt return yardage in a game. Groce moved up to second on the NU career punt return chart with his performance against Missouri. Groce has five punt returns of 25 yards or longer in 2002.

► **Place-kicking...**Senior place-kicker Josh Brown is 9-of-12 on field goals in 2002 and perfect in 43 PAT attempts. Brown has six field goals of 40 yards or longer this season. He entered the season with just four 40-yarders in 12 career attempts from that range. (NU opponents are 3-of-6 from 40-plus yards in 2002). Brown hit on field goals of 40 and 42 yards against Arizona State, marking the first time in his career he has made a pair of 40+-yard field goals in the same game and had a 44-yarder vs. Utah State. He added 42-yarders against Missouri and Texas A&M and connected on a career regular-season long 48-yard field goal against Texas. Brown missed a fourth-quarter field goal vs. Missouri, ending a streak of eight straight field goals made.

Brown has hit 14 of his last 18 field goals dating back to last season. He ranks fourth at Nebraska with 297 career points.

B r o w n ' s performance on kickoff duties should not be left unnoticed with 35 of his 64 kickoffs this season (3-8 vs. Kansas) ending in touchbacks. Brown and Nebraska's kickoff coverage team have pinned opponents inside the 20 on 11 occasions.

► **Punting...**NU's Kyle Larson continues to prove that he is among the nation's top punters. Larson ranks 10th in the nation in punting with a 43.7-yard average on the season. He has also pinned the opposition inside the 20 16 times, including three times each vs. Troy State and Oklahoma State. He has pinned opponents inside the 10-yard line seven times, including twice at Penn State. Husker opponents have pinned Nebraska inside the 20 on punts 13 times.

Larson has averaged better than 45 yards per punt seven times this year (46.2 vs. TSU; 57.3 vs. USU, 46.8 vs. PSU, 47.2 vs. ISU, 50.5 vs. A&M, 45.5 vs. Texas, 50.2 vs. Kansas) with a career-best 57.3 vs. Utah State, when he also had a career-best 71 yarder. Larson has had at least one punt of 45 yards or more in every game except McNeese State when he punted just twice, and had a season-high five punts of 45 yards or more vs. Penn State and Kansas (four of 50 yards or more). Larson has had a season-high six punts five times. Nebraska is fourth nationally in net punting at 39.30 yards per attempt. Larson, a Ray Guy Award candidate, has been NU's nominee for Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week three times.

► **Blocked Kicks...**NU has had a history of being one of the nation's best kick blocking units. The Huskers have exhibited the same ability this season, blocking five punts, including two blocked punts by Lannie Hopkins in last week's win over Kansas. Hopkins' second blocked kick of the day was returned 30 yards by Aaron Terpening for a touchdown, NU's second return of a blocked punt for a touchdown this season. Hopkins and Demorrio

Huskers Dominate Homecoming

Nebraska improved to 69-19-4 in Homecoming games with last week's 45-7 victory over Kansas. The win was NU's 34th straight Homecoming win at Memorial Stadium since 1968, when NU was shut out 12-0 by Kansas State. That game also marked the last time a Husker team was shut out at home. Kansas is Nebraska's most frequent Homecoming opponent, having played the Huskers 30 times on Homecoming, with NU now holding a 22-6-2 advantage against the Jayhawks.

Lord to Pilkington TD Connection at ISU Continues Nebraska Big Play History

The 90-yard TD pass from Jammal Lord to Ross Pilkington at Iowa State ranks as the third-longest pass play in NU history. The connection was the longest pass play by Nebraska since a school-record 95-yard TD pass from Fred Duda to Freeman White in 1965.

The 90-yard TD was the ninth play from scrimmage of 90 yards or more in school history and also marked the second straight year NU has had a 90-plus yard play from scrimmage. In 2001, Eric Crouch broke open NU's win at Missouri with a school-record 95-yard TD run. The Huskers have had a scoring play of 90 yards or more in three straight seasons and four of five years under Frank Solich. Bobby Newcombe returned a punt 94 yards for a score against MU in 2000, while Joe Walker brought a kickoff back 99 yards for a score in the 1998 season opener against Louisiana Tech.

Williams each blocked a punt in the second half of Nebraska's victory over Arizona State, marking the first time since a 1999 win over Kansas State that the Huskers have had two blocked punts in the same game. Williams' blocked punt was returned six yards for a score by senior linebacker Scott Shanle. NU's third punt block of the year came at Iowa State, when Williams and Terpening teamed to block a third-quarter Cyclone punt, setting the Husker offense up for a touchdown. Texas A&M was the first opponent to block an NU punt this season and returned the ball for a first-quarter touchdown, and Texas blocked a Husker field goal this past week.

► **Kickoff Returns...** Junior Josh Davis finished 14th nationally in kickoff return average a year ago at 27.0 yards per return. This season Davis is averaging 23.31 yards per return, with a season-long 46-yarder vs. Texas. He has 10 kickoff returns of 25 yards or more in 2002, including three against Missouri. Davis ranks second at Nebraska in career kickoff return yardage with 1,307 yards and owns the top two season totals in school history, including his NU record 675 kickoff return yards in 2001. His 27 returns this fall are also a school record.

► **Kick Coverage...** Nebraska has allowed opponents to average just 17.7 yards on kickoff returns and only 8.7 yards on 22 punt returns this season. While Groce and Davis have combined for 15 returns of 25 yards or more, NU opponents have just four such returns (one punt, three kickoffs).

Huskers Scoring in All Three Facets of Game

Nebraska has reached the end zone 44 times this season, with the offense, defense and special teams all getting into the act. Of Nebraska's touchdowns, six have been non-offensive scores—two in each of the Huskers' first two games this season, DeJuan Groce's 89-yard punt return TD vs. Missouri and Aaron Terpening's 30-yard return of a blocked punt vs. Kansas.

In the season opener vs. ASU, Nebraska scored via a blocked punt return and an interception return. DeJuan Groce supplied two special teams touchdowns against Troy State, returning punts 83 and 72 yards for scores, setting a school and Big 12 record and tying an NCAA record. The first two games this season marked the first time Nebraska has recorded two or more non-offensive scores in consecutive games since the 1996 season. In that year, NU returned an interception (Ralph Brown) and a kickoff (Kenny Cheatham) for a TD at Oklahoma and the following week vs. Missouri returned a blocked punt for a score (Terrell Farley) and recorded a safety when the Tigers fumbled the ball out of the end zone.

The Huskers have now scored by defense or special teams in eight of their last 18 games dating back to last season (4 of 11 in 2002). Eight members of the 2002 team have scored non-offensive TDs in their careers led by Groce's five scores, all punt returns. Groce also became the first Husker to score two non-offensive touchdowns in a game since Julius Jackson had an interception return and a fumble return for TDs against Southern Mississippi in 1999.

Huskers Strive to Improve Turnover Ratio

In addition to special teams excellence, the Husker coaching staff regularly preaches the importance of a positive turnover margin. The Huskers were a +1 in that department in each of the first three games this season, but are a combined minus-6 in turnover margin in the past eight games, including a combined six-turnover disadvantage in four losses. Nebraska ranks 74th in the nation in turnover margin at -0.27. The Huskers were a plus-two in that department in last week's win over Kansas, picking off a pair of Jayhawk passes and recovering a fumble. Nebraska will face one of the nation's most opportunistic defenses this week. Kansas State ranks seventh nationally in turnover margin at +1.40 per game and has caused 31 opponent turnovers this fall.

In Nebraska's season opener, the Huskers returned an interception for a touchdown against Arizona State, while the Nebraska offense did not commit a turnover. The victory over Arizona State marked the first time since 1974 (Oregon) that Nebraska did not have a turnover in its season opener. That statistic is even more impressive considering the Huskers had a new starter at quarterback in Jammal Lord and were also breaking in three starters on the offensive front. Arizona State has since proven to have an opportunistic defense, forcing 33 turnovers in winning seven of its 10 games since the loss at Nebraska.

Groce Anchors Husker Secondary; Stars on Husker Special Teams

In recent years, Nebraska has a history of having an experienced cornerback on one side of the field, with a newcomer manning the other corner. In 1996, true freshman Ralph Brown started opposite senior Michael Booker. Brown then served as a mentor for both Erwin Swiney and Keyuo Craver later in his career. Two seasons ago, Craver anchored one corner while DeJuan Groce learned the ropes as a starter at right cornerback. This season, it is Groce's turn to handle the leadership role, as true freshman Fabian Washington has taken over the left cornerback spot.

Groce has shown why he is an All-America candidate and listed on the Jim Thorpe Award watch list. He has four interceptions and seven pass breakups this fall despite teams routinely avoiding his side of the field. Groce's shut-down abilities are a key factor in Nebraska ranking 22nd nationally in pass efficiency defense with a 105.73 rating.

Groce had a pass breakup and intercepted two passes against Troy State, helping the Husker defense hold the Trojans to just 11 of 29 in the passing department. He backed up that performance with two more interceptions and a breakup against Utah State.

Groce had a season-high three pass breakups at Texas A&M and now has 40 career PBU to rank third

on the NU career list and is the Huskers' single-season PBU record-holder with 17 in 2000. He has eight career interceptions, including four this season, just off the Husker top 10 season list and three from the school season record of seven, held by three players. Groce's eight career interceptions are also just off the career top 10 list. Groce had a career-high 15 tackles in Nebraska's game against Texas, the most by a Husker defensive back in four seasons.

The senior is a threat to become the first Husker to ever earn All-America honors at two positions in the same year. In addition to being among one of the nation's top corners, Groce is also an electrifying force on Husker special teams. Against Troy State, he set a school record and tied an NCAA mark with two punt return touchdowns. He added an 89-yard return for a touchdown against Missouri, giving him three this season, tying Johnny Rodgers' school record and moving him within one return TD of the NCAA record. Groce's punt return exploits earned him a spot on CNNSI.com's Midseason All-America team.

Groce averages 16.5 yards per punt return in his career and is averaging 19.5 yards on 30 returns this season to rank second in the nation. Groce totaled 114 yards on four punt returns against Missouri to move into second place on the NU career punt return yardage list, and he now has 1,072 career yards. Groce's 585 punt return yards this season rank second on the NU single-season chart, just 32 yards from Rodgers' single-season record of 618 yards, set in his Heisman-winning season in 1972. One of Groce's punt return touchdowns came in last year's 31-21 victory over Kansas State (60 yards).

Blackshirts Look for Return of Rush End Kelsay

Nebraska continues to improve on defense despite the loss of its most dominant player in the front seven. Senior rush end Chris Kelsay has missed the majority of the past six games with a hamstring injury. He practiced before the Kansas game, but did not play. He could return to action this Saturday vs. Kansas State.

Before his injury Kelsay had shown why he was a preseason All-Big 12 pick by the league's media. In addition to his first-team all-league notice by the conference media, Kelsay was a first-team All-Big 12 pick by *The Sporting News*, which listed him as the nation's No. 5 defensive end. Kelsay, a senior from Auburn, Neb., was also on preseason watch lists for the

Rotary Lombardi Award and the Bronko Nagurski Award.

The 6-5, 260-pound Kelsay is the anchor of the Husker defensive front. Despite missing the last 23-plus quarters of action, Kelsay is tied for the team lead with nine tackles for losses totaling 46 yards this season. He also still holds the team lead with 4.5 sacks for 38 yards and has a team-high 14 quarterback hurries. He tallied four QB hurries against both Utah State and Penn State. Kelsay recorded 1.5 sacks for 17 yards and four quarterback hurries against Arizona State and added his second career two-sack game against Utah State. Kelsay has also batted down two opposing passes, all while NU's opponents regularly double-teamed the senior captain.

Kelsay saw very limited action against McNeese State leaving in the first quarter with a strained right hamstring. The injury has forced him to miss Nebraska's last five games but Kelsay still had an impact in the games with his presence from the sideline. Several of his teammates credited Kelsay with encouraging the defensive troops from the sideline throughout the Blackshirts' top performance of 2002 vs. Missouri. In addition, Kelsay was instrumental in a defensive players' meeting where the defense set goals for the game. The goals set included 13 or fewer points, less than 100 yards rushing allowed and fewer than 250 total yards by the Tigers. NU met all of those goals.

Kelsay now has 10.5 sacks and 29 tackles for loss in his Husker career. Kelsay recorded 52 total tackles as a junior, including a team-best 17 tackles for losses totaling 58 yards and five sacks.

Thomas Among Nebraska's Career Receiving Leaders

Senior split end Wilson Thomas leads Nebraska with 25 receptions and three touchdowns this season. The 6-6 Thomas caught two passes for 40 yards against Kansas, including a 27-yard TD in the second quarter.

Thomas' two catches against Kansas pushed his career total to 63, good for ninth place on the NU career receptions chart. Thomas opened the season with a nine-yard TD against Arizona State, one of his three catches against the Sun Devils, and had four grabs against Troy State. Thomas grabbed his second TD of the year against Utah State on a 23-yard connection with Jammal Lord. He caught an NU season-high five passes for 49 yards against Iowa State and had a team-high four grabs for 47 yards in the win over McNeese State, before leading NU with four catches for a season-high 59 yards at Texas A&M.

The Texas A&M game marked the 14th game in his career that Thomas has caught three or more passes, including five times in 2002. He had three or more grabs nine times last season, including six each in key victories over Oklahoma and Kansas State. He capped the 2001 regular season with a career-best 109 receiving yards against Colorado, including a career-long 78-yard reception, the longest non-scoring pass in NU school history.

With 902 career receiving yards, Thomas ranks 14th on the NU charts and is 98 yards from becoming just the 12th player in school history to reach 1,000 career receiving yards.

Thomas' 37 receptions last year were the most by any Husker since All-American Irving Fryar caught 40 balls in 1983, and the sixth-most ever by a Husker. Thomas' 616 receiving yards ranked as the fifth-best single-season total in school history and was a record for Husker split ends.

Thomas has spent his past two offseasons playing for Coach Barry Collier's Husker basketball team. Last season Thomas averaged 4.6 points and 3.8 rebounds in 16 games, including a double-double with 12 points and 11 rebounds against Missouri in Lincoln.

(Doak Walker), Husker linebackers Scott Shanle and Barrett Ruud were two of the 67 preseason candidates for the Butkus Award, which announced 11 semifinalists for the award last month.

Shanle is fourth on the team with 58 tackles, including a season-high 10 stops against McNeese State. He also returned a blocked punt for a touchdown against Arizona State. Ruud is tied for second on the team in tackles with 63 and has a team-high nine tackles for loss, despite being plagued by injuries throughout the season. Ruud had 12 tackles and three tackles for loss in Nebraska's game against Texas.

Senior center John Garrison was named to the preseason watch list for the Outland Trophy and the Rimington Award, given annually to the nation's top center. The award is named in honor of former Husker Dave Rimington, a two-time Outland Trophy winner. Garrison is the leader of an offensive line that has helped NU to a Big 12-leading 289.5 rushing yards per game.

Junior punter Kyle Larson continues to prove he is one of the nation's best, averaging 43.7 yards on 52 punts this season to rank 10th nationally in punting average. Larson boomed four punts for a 57.3-yard average vs. Utah State, just off the single-game school record. Larson was named one of 10 semifinalists for the Ray Guy Award last week.

True Freshmen Making Big Impact for 2002 Huskers

Five true freshmen have seen action for Nebraska in 2002 and all have made immediate impacts. Split end Ross Pilkington is in his first season as a Husker after two seasons of minor league baseball, while I-back David Horne, split end Mark LeFlore, tight end Matt Herian and cornerback Fabian Washington are all just a year removed from high school.

The freshmen have proven to be difference-makers throughout the season, with their biggest impact in recent weeks. Nebraska had 369 yards of total offense at Oklahoma State, 204 (55 percent) of which were accounted for by true freshmen. Horne accounted for the largest chunk of the yardage with 125 rushing yards on 24 carries. The Texas A&M game was similar as the frosh accounted for 185 yards of total offense, with Horne rushing for 128 yards and Pilkington grabbing two passes for 52 yards. Washington added three pass breakups and seven tackles in the victory. Against Texas, NU freshmen combined for five of the Huskers' seven pass receptions.

The true freshmen wasted no time this season making their presence known. In fact, three of the five scored touchdowns on the first touch of their Husker careers. In the season opener, Washington intercepted an Arizona State pass and returned it 29 yards for a touchdown. Two games later against Utah State, Herian turned his first career reception into a 33-yard TD. He has since added two pass receptions, a 44-yarder at Oklahoma State and a 60-yard TD catch vs. Texas. He averages 45.7 yards on his three catches.

LeFlore got into the act against McNeese State, taking his first career carry on a reverse 64 yards for a touchdown to give NU a 31-7 fourth-quarter advantage. Horne has scored two touchdowns and Pilkington scored on a 90-yard TD at Iowa State, the Huskers' longest pass play in 37 years.

Washington and Pilkington were the only two members of the group to play in the season opener. The 6-0, 175-pound Washington took over starting duties at left corner against McNeese State and has a nose for the football. Washington has four interceptions this season and has also recovered and forced a fumble, while breaking up a team-high 11 passes, one off the NU freshman record.

Pilkington ranks second on the team in receptions with 13 and leads the Huskers in receiving yards with 277, good for a 21.3-yard per catch average. He had a streak of eight straight games with a catch end against Kansas, but his 13 receptions have established a new NU freshman record. His 277 receiving yards leave him just five yards away from Johnny Mitchell's 1990 frosh receiving yardage record of 282 yards. Pilkington originally committed to the Huskers in February of 2000, but played two seasons of minor league baseball in the Colorado Rockies' organization before coming to Lincoln.

Three Huskers saw action as true freshmen in 2001—Mike 'backer Barrett Ruud, rover Philip Bland and receiver Mike Stuntz. Bland became the first true freshman to start since 1997 (Erwin Swiney and Joe Walker). Stuntz has moved back to quarterback after playing split end last year. He was the first skill-position player (QB, RB or WR) under Solich to bypass a redshirt season and this year has been joined by Pilkington, LeFlore and Horne.

Huskers Pull Off Historic Comeback at Texas A&M

The Huskers showed their resilience in picking up a 38-31 victory at Texas A&M on Oct. 26, just the Aggies' 11th home loss in the past 14 years. In the game, Nebraska rallied from a 31-14 third-quarter deficit to upend the Aggies. The rally was one of the top come-from-behind efforts in school history and Nebraska's best under Head Coach Frank Solich.

A few notes on Nebraska's comeback victory at Texas A&M.

- ▶ The previous largest deficit Nebraska had overcome to win under Frank Solich was 10 points against Missouri on Oct. 24, 1998, in Lincoln. NU trailed 13-3 in the second quarter, but rallied for a

▶ The Huskers' rally from 17 points behind was their largest in any game since a 59-23 win at Kansas in 1991. NU trailed 17-0 in the first quarter of that contest, but used six Calvin Jones TD runs to pave the way to an easy victory.

▶ Nebraska's previous victory when trailing after three quarters was on Nov. 27, 1998, when the Huskers trailed Colorado 14-13 after three quarters, but pulled out a 16-14 victory.

▶ Before the A&M game, NU had not won a game when trailing at any point in the fourth quarter since a 34-32 victory over Colorado on Nov. 24, 2000. CU led 32-31 late in the game, but NU's Josh Brown hit a game-winning field goal on the last play of the contest.

▶ Nebraska trailed 31-21 entering the fourth quarter at Texas A&M. The last time Nebraska rallied from a bigger deficit entering the fourth quarter was on Oct. 22, 1966, at Colorado. The Huskers trailed 19-7 entering the fourth quarter, but rallied for a 21-19 victory. Nebraska rallied from 10-point deficits entering the fourth quarter twice for bowl victories under Tom Osborne. NU trailed Florida 10-0 entering the fourth in the 1974 Sugar Bowl and won 13-10 and was behind North Carolina 17-7 heading into the fourth quarter of the 1977 Liberty Bowl, but escaped with a 21-17 victory.

Three Seniors Serving as 2002 Team Captains

Three seniors were elected team captains by their teammates before the start of the season—center John Garrison, rush end Chris Kelsay and cornerback DeJuan Groce.

Kelsay is the second member of his family to serve as a Nebraska football captain, joining his brother, Chad, a captain on Solich's first team in 1998. The Kelsays are the fifth brother combination in school history to serve as team captains, joining Mike (1983) and Andy Keeler (1988), Erik (1991) and Zach Wiegert (1994), Christian (1995) and Jason Peter (1997) and Grant (1997) and Tracey Wistrom (2001). The 2002 campaign marks the first season Nebraska has had only three captains since the 1987 campaign. The Huskers had five captains a year ago and six in 2000.

Poll Position

Nebraska fell out of the top 25 in both polls after the loss at Iowa State, ending a streak of 348 straight weeks in the Associated Press Poll. Nebraska had been ranked in every AP weekly poll since October of 1981.

The Huskers remaining games against a pair of ranked teams—Kansas State and Colorado. Four Big 12 teams are ranked this week, including Texas (t4 AP/3 Coaches), Oklahoma (t4/6), Kansas State (11/11) and Colorado (17/18). Iowa State was ranked when Nebraska met the Cyclones in September and non-conference foe Penn State is 16th in both polls.

Nebraska opened the 2002 season ranked in the Associated Press preseason top 25 for the 33rd consecutive season. The Huskers were ranked No. 10 in this year's AP preseason listing, the 10th consecutive season Nebraska has opened in the Top 10. The Huskers were ranked eighth in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches preseason poll.

Nebraska's AP preseason ranking was its lowest since opening at No. 11 in 1992, but marked the fifth straight season under Solich that NU was in the preseason top 10. Under Solich, NU's loftiest preseason ranking came in 2000, when the Huskers were listed first in both AP and coaches polls.

Nebraska Personnel/Injury Update

Senior rush end Chris Kelsay has missed Nebraska's past five games with a hamstring injury, but hopes to return to action this week. His injury is the latest in a series of injuries to hit Nebraska's defensive front four. In the preseason, senior nose tackle Jason Lohr was lost for the season with a torn left ACL. In game one vs. Arizona State, redshirt freshman defensive tackle Jared Helming also tore the ACL in his left knee and was lost for the season. In addition, redshirt freshman Seppo Ewvarayeis out for the season with an injury to his right shoulder, while freshman DT Brandon Greeson, who is redshirting this fall, will also miss the remainder of fall practice with a shoulder injury.

35 Former Huskers on NFL Opening-Day Rosters

Nebraska remains among the nation's leaders in supplying talent to the National Football League. In fact, the Huskers had a Big 12-best 45 players in 2002 NFL training camps and 35 of those players currently find themselves on 2002 rosters. Nebraska had 30 players on active 2002 opening day rosters to rank eighth nationally and tops among Big 12 schools.

Among Nebraska's notable alumni on NFL rosters are 10-year veteran offensive guard Will Shields of the Kansas City Chiefs, who has appeared in seven consecutive Pro Bowls. Green Bay's Ahman Green finished fourth in the NFL in rushing last season with 1,387 yards, while St. Louis DE Grant Wistrom has been a key component in a Ram defense that has helped the team to the Super Bowl in two of the last three years. Carolina Panther defensive end Mike Rucker was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Month in September and is among the league leaders in sacks and fumbles caused. Safety Mike Minter, Carolina's all-time leading tackler has intercepted two passes, including one that he returned for a touchdown.

Since 1994, NU has had 53 players selected in the NFL Draft, the third-most of any school in the nation and tops among Big 12 Conference schools.

Huskers in the NFL

Husker Team and Individual Notes...

NU Continues 113th Season with Streaks in Place

Nebraska's streak of being ranked in the Associated Press poll ended at 348 weeks after Nebraska's loss at Iowa State. Despite the end to that streak, Nebraska continues its 113th season of intercollegiate football with several streaks in place, including an unprecedented 33 consecutive nine-win seasons.

▶ **NCAA-record 254 consecutive sellouts in Memorial Stadium**—Nebraska's game with Kansas was the 254th straight sellout at Memorial Stadium. "Nebraska football fans are the best football fans in the world," said famed broadcaster Keith Jackson. Since the North and South end zones were built in 1964, Husker fans started a tradition of saluting the opposing team as it leaves the stadium with a standing ovation—regardless of the game's outcome. Among Big 12 Conference schools, Oklahoma has the next longest string of consecutive sellouts with 23, 231 fewer than Nebraska.

▶ **40 consecutive winning seasons**—Nebraska holds the current NCAA record and ranks second all time behind Notre Dame's 42 consecutive winning seasons from 1889 to 1932. The streak began in 1962, the first year under Coach Bob Devaney, who was lured to Nebraska from Wyoming by Director of Athletics Tippy Dye. A win on Saturday would ensure Nebraska's 41st straight winning campaign.

▶ **33 consecutive nine-win seasons**—Even more incredible than 40 consecutive winning seasons is Nebraska's NCAA record for consecutive nine-win seasons. Although some called for his resignation after a pair of 6-4 seasons in 1967 and 1968, Devaney stayed and redesigned the offense to an I-formation with an unbalanced line at the suggestion of then-assistant

coach Tom Osborne. The Huskers won nine games in 1969 and have won at least that many in every year since.

▶ **40 bowl appearances**—Biff Jones accepted the Huskers' first bowl bid following the 1940 season, agreeing to play in the 1941 Rose Bowl. The celebration in Lincoln lasted 24 hours and classes were canceled. While Nebraska lost to Stanford, 21-13, Nebraska has now appeared in 40 bowl games and is tied for fourth among all NCAA Division I-A schools behind Alabama's 51. Devaney used to joke that he lived in Lincoln several years before he found out Nebraska lost that first bowl game—a true testament to the support Nebraska football receives in Lincoln.

▶ **33 consecutive bowl bids**—NU's streak of 33 consecutive bowl appearances is an NCAA record and dates back to 1969 when Devaney's eighth team defeated Georgia 45-6 in the Sun Bowl. Michigan is the only other school with an active streak of 20 or more straight bowl appearances with 27. Nebraska became bowl-eligible with Saturday's victory over Kansas.

▶ **33 consecutive years ranked in AP top 25**—Since the 1969 season, Nebraska has been ranked each season among the top 25 in the final AP poll. NU has also been ranked in the top 25 in every AP preseason poll since 1970.

▶ **109-16 record since 1993**—In the last nine years, Nebraska has lost just 16 games and has lost more than two games in a season just twice (1998, 2002). In that span, the Huskers went undefeated three times, winning national championships in 1994, 1995 and 1997. Nebraska also played for the national title in 1993 and 2001.

Unprecedented Winning Tradition

Nebraska, the nation's third-winningest program all time (fourth by percentage), boasts a 771-305-40 record in 1,116 games (.709). In the last 34 years, NU is tops, posting a record of 337-64-5 for an .836 winning percentage (406 games), an average of more than 10 wins per year. In terms of victories, the Huskers are third in NCAA Division I-A history with 771.

NU has won 10-or-more games 22 times in the Devaney/Osborne/Solich eras (since 1962), went undefeated and untied through the regular season seven times, played in 13 national title games (for at least one of the teams) and won the championship five times. Since the first Nebraska season in 1890, Husker teams have won 11 or more games 12 times, including seven of the last nine years. NU has won 12 or more games seven times, and 13 games three times (1971, 1994 and 1997).

No one can match Nebraska's current 40-year winning season streak, or its 33-year nine-win streak, and by the same token, no other school has averaged 10 wins per season over the last 33 years. Nebraska's 40 years of consecutive winning records rank second all time behind Notre Dame's 42 (1889-32) and third in terms of non-losing seasons, behind Penn State's 49 (1939-87) and Notre Dame's 42 (1889-1932) and tied with Texas' 40 (1893-32). Nebraska (702), Michigan (705), Alabama (728) and Notre Dame (736) were the only four programs to have won 700 games in the last century. Nebraska became the first Division I team to win 100 or more games in back-to-back decades, ranking first in the 1980s (103-20-0, .837) and second in the 1990s (108-16-1 record, .890) and posted a nation's best 309-56-5 record in the 1970s, 1980s and 1990s.

Huskers Win Three National Titles in Four Years

In 1993, the Huskers went 11-1 losing only to Florida State, 18-16, in the Orange Bowl for the national championship. That loss began a run of wins, records and crystal collections. Nebraska followed 1993 with three perfect seasons in four years, winning national titles in 1994 (13-0), 1995 (12-0) and 1997 (13-0). No other team won three titles in the 1990s. Nebraska posted incredible numbers from 1993 on, consider...

NU First to Win 100 Games in Back-to-Back Decades

Nebraska recorded its 100th win of the 1990s with a 40-10 win over Missouri in Columbia on Sept. 25, 1999, and finished with a 108-16-1 mark in the decade (.868, second behind Florida State). Nebraska is the first Division I program to win 100-plus games in consecutive decades as NU won 103 games to 20 losses in the 1980s. The only other team to post 100-plus wins in the 1980s was Brigham Young with 102 wins and 26 losses. Oklahoma (102-13-3) and Alabama (103-16-1) posted 100-plus wins in the 1970s, while Nebraska came close to achieving the mark in three consecutive decades, as NU won 98 games in the 1970s. Florida State finished the 1990s with a 109-13-1 record (.890, first), but had just 87 wins in the 1980s.

By decade, the Huskers were 75-30-1 in the 1960s (.712); 98-20-4 in the 1970s (.820, fifth nationally), 103-20-0 in the 1980s (.837, first), 108-16-1 in the 1990s (second) and are 28-8 in this decade. Nebraska's 1990s record was aided by an unprecedented 60-3 five-year run from 1993 to 1997. Nebraska owns the best record over the past three-plus decades with a 337-64-5 record, including an NCAA-best 309-56-5 record (.842) from 1960 to 1999. The Huskers have not lost more than 20 games in any of the last three decades.

Devaney Established Tradition

Retiring as the winningest active coach in the nation, Tom Osborne took over a program firmly entrenched in solid ground in 1973, when Hall of Fame Coach Bob Devaney named Osborne as his successor. Devaney posted a 101-20-2 record in his 11 years at Nebraska, won two national championships (1970 and 1971) and was the winningest active coach in the nation upon his retirement in 1972 with a 136-30-7 career record (.806) including a 35-10-5 record at the University of Wyoming.

Osborne followed suit and was selected to the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame shortly after he announced his retirement (inducted on Dec. 8, 1998). Osborne retired as the nation's winningest active coach, posting a 255-49-3 record (.836). Among all divisions of coaches with career winning percentages of .800 or better over a span of at least 10 years, Osborne is the fifth-winningest coach in Division I-A history, while the late Devaney is not far behind at No. 11.

Devaney and Osborne were the third Division I coaching duo to post back-to-back 100-win careers at the same institution (following Penn State's Rip Engle and Joe Paterno and Georgia Tech's John Heisman, Bill Alexander and Bobby Dodd), but were the first pair to do so in an unbelievable 21 years. Devaney and Osborne had a combined 356-69-5 record for an incredible .834 winning percentage (36 years, 430 games).

Frank Solich went 9-4 in his inaugural season, matching the wins of Devaney and Osborne in their first years and posted a school-record 12-1 second-year record (winning the Big 12 championship), a 10-2 record his third season, was 11-2 last year, playing in the national championship game, and is 7-4 in 2002, for a 49-13 five-year record. Devaney went 10-1 his second year (1963) winning his first Big Eight championship, while Osborne first won 10 games his third year when he also won a share of his first Big Eight title (1975).

NU in Big 12 Conference Action

Nebraska is 439-146-16 all time vs. Big 12 Conference teams. Since the Big 12 was formed in 1996, Nebraska is 44-10 in the league (25-2 at home), losing to Texas A&M in College Station (28-21), Texas in Lincoln (20-16) and Kansas State in Manhattan (40-30) in 1998; to Texas (24-20) in Austin in 1999; and to Oklahoma in Norman (31-14) and K-State in Manhattan (29-28) in 2000; at Colorado (62-36) in 2001; and at Iowa State (36-14), at Oklahoma State (24-21) and vs. Texas (27-24) this season. Nebraska is 28-10 in the Big 12 under Coach Solich. Nebraska's loss to Texas ended a streak of 14 straight home conference victories. It was NU's first home loss since Texas defeated the Huskers on Oct. 31, 1998, which ended NU's school-record 47-game home winning streak.

NU Leads Conference in Crowns

Nebraska is the only team to capture two Big 12 titles in the first six years of the championship game, winning titles in 1997 and 1999. Nebraska also appeared in the league title game in 1996.

The Huskers lost to Texas, 37-27, in the inaugural championship in St. Louis in 1996, defeated Texas A&M in 1997 in San Antonio, 54-15, and defeated Texas in San Antonio in 1999, 22-6. The Nebraska vs. Texas matchup in the 1999 Big 12 Championship Game marked the first time the game featured two teams that

played each other in the regular season.

In the last nine years, Nebraska has won five conference crowns (three Big Eight, two Big 12). Nebraska has won 43 football conference championships overall, including eight under Coach Bob Devaney, 13 under Coach Tom Osborne and one under Coach Solich.

Memorial Stadium Dominance

Nebraska's nation-best 26-game home winning streak ended with a Nov. 2 loss to Texas. Nebraska is 6-1 at home this season and has won at least six home games for each of the past 16 seasons. Nebraska is 95-4 at home the last 14 years, losing to two teams that went on to win a share of the national championship (Colorado in 1990 and Washington in 1991), and to Texas in 1998 and 2002. The Texas losses are Nebraska's lone home setbacks since 1991, with the Huskers having won 73 of their past 75 home games.

Head Coach Frank Solich is aware of the special edge the Huskers have in Lincoln. *"I think every team that plays at home has a home-field advantage, but we have a special one here. That is due to the fans and how they react."*

Opposing coaches have also taken notice of the great fan base at Nebraska. *"That is the loudest situation we've been in since I've been at Texas. It is a special place. The Nebraska fans should be a role model for everybody."* - Texas Coach Mack Brown following Nov. 2 game at Nebraska

The Huskers are 462-123-20 (.780, 605 games, 113 years) in Lincoln, 337-100-13 (.763, 450 games, 80 years) in Memorial Stadium (since 1923) and 32-2 at home under Coach Solich. Nebraska has not lost more than one home game in a season since a 5-2 home record in 1980. Since then, the Huskers are 139-11 at Memorial Stadium, with eight of those losses coming against teams that finished in the top six in the final AP poll (Texas is No. 4 in this week's poll). Included in that stretch are four of the six longest home winning streaks in school history, including a school-record 47-game streak (fifth longest in nation all time) from 1991 to 1998, a 19-game streak from 1988 to 1990, a 21-game streak from 1981 to 1984 and the 26-game string that ended with the 27-24 loss to Texas on Nov. 2.

Nebraska also had a 33-game home winning streak from 1901 to 1906 (which is tied for the 11th-longest streak in Division I-A). Since 1986 (16 years), NU is 106-6 in Lincoln, with losses to Colorado, Washington, Oklahoma (twice) and Texas (twice). Five of those teams posted a combined mark of 53-6-1 in their respective seasons, while Texas is 9-1 this fall.

Nebraska has not been shut out at home since a 12-0 loss to Kansas State in 1968 (219 games). NU has posted 40 unbeaten and untied home seasons, including 2001 when NU went 8-0. Against Texas on Nov. 2, the Huskers set a new attendance record in Memorial Stadium with 78,268 fans.

NCAA Record 254 Consecutive Sellouts

Nebraska's Memorial Stadium boasts an NCAA-record 254 consecutive sellouts dating back to Hall of Fame Coach Bob Devaney's first year in 1962 (vs. Missouri on Nov. 3). Notre Dame is second in all-time consecutive sellouts with 166, 88 fewer than Nebraska.

NU is 227-27 during the 254 sellouts (50-9 under Devaney, 145-16 under Osborne, 32-2 under Solich). The mark includes a 37-19 record against ranked teams. NU is 5-0 in the four milestone

sellouts during that period (50th, 100th, 150th, 200th and 250th sellouts), including a 24-7 win over No. 2 Colorado on Oct. 29, 1994 (No. 200) and a 44-13 victory over Utah State on Sept. 7 (No. 250). Nebraska's Nov. 29 home game with Colorado is sold out, which will give the Huskers 255 consecutive sellouts at the end of the 2002 season.

Team Snippets...

► **FieldTurf...**Nebraska is 26-1 on FieldTurf, the artificial grass surface installed in NU's Memorial Stadium before the 1999 season. FieldTurf emulates the look and feel of blades of grass by blending polyethylene and polypropylene, which specially treats the surface to be soft, smooth and strong. The 2.50-inch blades are resistant to extremes in temperature and have an ultraviolet protectant to help resist fading. Memorial Stadium was filled with 200,000 pounds of ground rubber, recycled from Nebraska tires, and silica sand, before the turf was installed. NU was the first Division I school to install the surface, which has also been installed at other professional facilities and Division I schools. Memorial Stadium featured a grass playing field from its opening in 1923 through the 1969 season. Astro-Turf was first installed in 1970 and replaced in 1977. Artificial All-Pro Turf was installed in 1984 and replaced with AstroTurf-8 in 1992 before the FieldTurf was installed in July of 1999.

► **Positively Speaking on Turnovers...**In the last 28 years, NU has had just one season with a negative turnover margin (minus five in 1984). Under Solich, NU has a cumulative turnover margin of plus-11.

► **When Nebraska Trails...**Nebraska has trailed in six games in 2002, rallying to defeat Missouri after trailing 13-7 and Texas A&M after falling behind 31-14. NU failed to recover from deficits at Penn State, Iowa State and Oklahoma State and vs. Texas. The Huskers trailed in seven games in 2001, but rallied to win the first five before losing at Colorado and against Miami. The Texas A&M game was the first time in 2002, NU had trailed at the half and won (previously against Kansas State in 2001, erasing a 14-13 halftime deficit). The last time Nebraska led at the half and lost was a 24-21 setback at Oklahoma State after NU led 7-3 at halftime. The Texas A&M contest also marked the first time in two seasons NU had trailed in the fourth quarter and won (previously against Colorado on Nov. 24, 2000, where the Huskers marched 44 yards in 47 seconds to set up Josh Brown's 29-yard field goal as time expired). The CU win marked the first time since statistics have been kept (since 1946) that the Huskers won on the last play of regulation. The 17-point deficit Nebraska rallied from at Texas A&M was the largest NU has overcome under Coach Solich, (previous was 10 points vs. Missouri in 1998, when NU trailed 13-3 in the second quarter, but rallied for a 20-13 victory. The biggest halftime rally under Solich was when Nebraska was down 9-0 at Kansas in 1999, before winning 24-17.

► **After a Loss...**Nebraska has lost back-to-back games just 12 times since 1962. Nebraska's consecutive losses at Penn State and Iowa State marked the first time since 1976 that NU had lost back-to-back regular-season games. Nebraska ended the 2001 season losing its last two games, at Colorado and to Miami, but has not lost three straight games since the 1961 season. Of the 12 back-to-back losses in the past 40 years, eight were losses to end the regular season followed by a loss in the bowl games.

► **In Overtime...**The Huskers are 3-0 in overtime games, defeating Missouri, 45-38, in Columbia in 1997; Colorado, 33-30, in Boulder in 1999; and Notre Dame in South Bend, 27-24, in 2000. In 1997, Missouri won the coin toss and Nebraska scored in three plays on a 12-yard Scott Frost run, then held the Tigers. Against CU, Nebraska won the coin toss, held the Buffs to a field goal, then scored five plays later on a one-yard Eric Crouch run. Against Notre Dame, NU won the toss, chose defense, held the Irish to a field goal, then scored five plays later on a Crouch seven-yard run. All three of NU's overtime wins were on the road and were won by rushing touchdowns (two by Crouch).

Huskers Own 15 NCAA Rushing Titles

The Nebraska running game was not its usual self early in the season, but has gotten untracked in recent weeks. Nebraska has averaged 346.8 yards the past six weeks, including a season-high 444 yards vs. McNeese State. The Huskers now average 289.5 yards per game to lead the Big 12 Conference and rank third nationally, just 10 yards behind NCAA leader Air Force (299.5 ypg). Over the years, the Huskers have rolled up unparalleled rushing numbers in college football.

The Huskers have led the nation in rushing 15 times in school history, including 2001. The Huskers averaged 314.7 yards a year ago, 33 yards per game more than runner-up Rice's total of 281.5. NU led the nation with 47 touchdowns (six more than second-place BYU) and yards per rush (5.62), edging out BYU, which averaged 5.61 per carry.

The Huskers have won the rushing title seven times in the last 10 years and 13 of the last 22 titles. Since 1978, Nebraska has ranked in the top six in rushing average every year and has averaged 300 or more yards rushing per game in all but four of the last 25 years (1993, 1996, 1998 and 1999).

More Husker Rushing Numbers

NU is 192-7-0 in the last 30 years when rushing for 300 or more yards in a game (most recently 352 vs. Kansas) and had won 110 straight when rushing for 300-plus yards before the loss at Colorado last season, when the Huskers rushed for 354 yards. Nebraska lost to Texas 27-24 on Nov. 2 despite rushing for 320 yards. Nebraska is 96-0 since 1973 when rushing for 400 or more yards, most recently rushing for 444 yards against McNeese State.

NU has had 374, 100-yard rushing performances all time (61 under Coach Solich, most recently David Horne, 122 and Dahrnan Diedrick, 107 vs. Kansas) including 58 games in which two or more Huskers rushed for 100 yards (most recently vs. Kansas). Before having four rushers top the century mark against Baylor on Oct. 13, 2001, NU had three rushers top the 100-yard mark in a game only twice in school history, recording the feat against Kansas in 2000 (Dan Alexander, Correll Buckhalter and Crouch) and against Arizona State in 1988 (Ken Clark, Steve Taylor and Terry Rodgers). The Iowa game in 2000 marked the only time in the 56 games where there were two-or-more 100-yard rushers, and Nebraska failed to score at least one rushing touchdown. Jammal Lord's 234-yard effort vs. Texas (NU quarterback record) was NU's 32nd all-time 200-yard performance.

Nebraska is 27-2 under Solich when the team rushes for 300 or more yards; 11-0 when rushing for 400 or more and 2-0 when rushing for 500 or more. Solich is 33-9 when a Husker rushes for at least 100 yards, and 8-8 when an opponent has a 100-yard rusher (most recently 182 yards by Oklahoma State's Tatum Bell). Among current Huskers, Diedrick has eight 100-yard games, including seven in 2001, to lead the team. Lord has five 100-yard games this year, while true freshman David Horne has posted three 100-yard outings in the past four weeks. Fullback Judd Davies topped 100 yards last season at Baylor.

Iowa State became the first opponent to hold Nebraska to less than 100 yards rushing (81 yards) since Oklahoma State held the Huskers to 73 yards in 1998.

Nebraska rushed for an NCAA and school-bowl-record 524 yards vs. Florida in the 1996 Fiesta Bowl on a school-bowl-record 68 attempts with a school-bowl-record six rushing touchdowns. NU also had six rushing touchdowns in the 1998 Orange Bowl vs. Tennessee.

Adding up the Points

Nebraska is averaging 30.4 points per game in 2002 to rank seventh in the Big 12. The Huskers have a long history of ranking among the nation's leaders in scoring offense and have averaged more than 35 points a game 15 times in the last 16 years. Last season NU finished with an average of 37.4 points per game to finish sixth nationally and second in the Big 12. NU scored 35 or more points eight times last season and has topped 35 points five times in 2002.

Nebraska has averaged 30 or more points per game for 24 straight years (since 1978) and has averaged 40 or more points eight times since 1982, including four of the past seven seasons. The Huskers have ranked among the nation's top 10 in scoring average for 22 of the last 24 years (since 1978) and finished first on four occasions (1982, 1983, 1994 and 1997).

Before the loss at Colorado last season, NU had won 236 consecutive games when scoring 35 or more points, and the Huskers are 303-2 all time when scoring 35 or more points, losing only to Oklahoma, 49-35, in 1950 and at Colorado, 62-36, in 2001.

The last time the Huskers were shut out was a 19-0 loss at Arizona State in 1996. Nebraska has since scored in 86 straight games. Nebraska has not been shut out at home since KSU shut out the Huskers, 12-0, on Homecoming in 1968 (220 games). Offensively, the Huskers have been shut out just five times since 1962, including once at home during that span. The Huskers have not been shut out by a conference opponent since a 27-0 loss at Oklahoma in 1973. NU was shut out by Miami in the 1992 Orange Bowl (22-0), the only time the Huskers have been shut out in a bowl game.

Nebraska was held scoreless in the first half at Kansas in 1999, marking the first time that a regular-season opponent had accomplished that feat since the Arizona State game in 1996. Miami also held the

Huskers scoreless in the first half of the 2002 Rose Bowl. The Huskers have scored 30 or more points in six of their last eight bowl games, including a school and NCAA bowl-record 66 vs. Northwestern in the 2000 Alamo Bowl.

Shutting Down the Opposition

The Huskers have won 103 straight games when holding opponents to 10 points or less dating back to a 10-7 loss to Iowa on Sept. 12, 1981. In fact, NU is 211-5-1 since 1962 (Devaney's first year) when holding opponents to 10 or fewer points, including 21-0 under Solich. NU has posted 100 shutouts in school history with 62 of them taking place since Bob Devaney's first season in 1962. The Huskers have four shutouts under Solich, most recently a 59-0 whitewash of Baylor in 2000.

Attack Defense Historically Solid vs. the Rush

Since going to the 4-3 attack defense in 1993, the Husker "D" has posted five of the school's top seven rush defense averages, allowing 79.3 ypg in 1994, 78.4 ypg in 1995 (back-to-back national championship teams), 83.8 ypg in 1996, 73.4 ypg in 1997 and 77.1 ypg in 1999. The 1997 average ranked second all time at NU and third nationally. Nebraska has never led the nation in rushing defense, but has ranked in the top 20 in six of the last eight years. Since 1946, the Nebraska defense has allowed 100 or fewer rushing yards per game over the course of the season 13 times, the first of which was 1963.

Nebraska is allowing 121.2 rushing yards per game in 2002 to rank 33rd nationally. The Husker defense has held three straight foes to less than 80 yards rushing and the three teams averaged just 67.7 yards in those games.

Associated Press Poll Record Halted at 348 Weeks

Nebraska's loss at Iowa State dropped the Huskers out of the Associated Press Poll, ending its AP poll record at 348 consecutive weeks (every weekly AP poll since Oct. 17, 1981 to Sept. 22, 2002).

Nebraska has now been in 522 of the last 532 AP polls since 1969 (33 consecutive years), missing one week in 1977, two weeks in 1981 and the past seven weeks. Nebraska was ranked among the top 10 in the 2002 preseason poll, which marked the 27th time in the last 30 years that NU has opened the season in the top 10. With a No. 8 final AP ranking in 2001, NU finished among the AP top 10 for the 30th time since the first poll in 1936 and for the 24th time since 1970.

Nebraska has been among the top 10 in the final AP poll eight of the last nine years (all except 1998). NU is the nation's fifth-most successful program based on AP rankings since the poll began, scoring 547 points, and NU was the only team to be ranked in every poll of the 1990s.

Nebraska's nation-leading streak of consecutive weeks in the AP top 10 ended at 54 with the loss at Penn State, but the Huskers have been ranked in the top 10 for 151 of the last 166 weeks, beginning with the 1993 preseason poll to present. Nebraska spent 96 straight weeks in the top 10 from 1993 to 1998.

Against AP Ranked Teams

Nebraska is 89-94-3 (.487, 186 games) all time vs. AP ranked opponents, not a bad percentage considering NU started with a 7-35 mark before Coach Bob Devaney came on the scene in 1962. Over the last nine seasons, the Huskers have gone 28-12 against ranked foes, with none of the losses at home. Nebraska has won 14 of its last 19 games against top 10 AP teams (since 1994).

The Huskers are 0-2 this season against AP ranked opponents, losing at No. 19 Iowa State 36-14 and to No. 7 Texas 27-24. Penn State was unranked by AP when it defeated NU, 40-7. Over the last 29 years, NU is 71-47-1 (.601, 119 games) vs. ranked teams. In the 1990s, NU was 27-10-1 (counting the Jan. 2, 2000, win over Tennessee).

Solich is 10-10 vs. ranked teams (4-5 vs. top 10 AP teams), and has lost just once at home to a ranked AP team (6-1 home, 1-7 away, 3-2 neutral). Both of Nebraska's remaining opponents are ranked in this week's AP poll, including Kansas State at No. 11 and 17th-ranked Colorado.

NU vs. the Unranked

The Huskers have lost just 15 of 249 games to unranked AP opponents since 1973 (39-3 record under Solich). Nebraska has lost just five games to unranked opponents at home in that time. Oklahoma State's 24-21 win over Nebraska was the Huskers' second setback against an unranked foe in 2002. Although Penn State was ranked 25th according to the coaches at game time, the Nittany Lions were unranked by the Associated Press, marking NU's first loss to an unranked foe since a 20-16 defeat vs. Texas on Oct. 31, 1998. Nebraska had won 27 straight vs. unranked foes before the loss at Penn State.

Before the Oct. 19 loss in Stillwater, Iowa State's 19-10 upset of the Huskers in 1992 was the last time NU had lost a road game against a team that was not ranked in either poll. In the last 30 years, Nebraska has gone 232-15-2 against unranked AP opponents (.936, 249 games, six losses since 1990) and suffered only one loss to a team that finished the season below .500 (Iowa State in 1992). The last time NU lost in Lincoln to a team with a losing record at game time was to Kansas State (12-0) in 1968 (2-5 record at game time).

Husker Title Runs

Nebraska has played in 13 national championship bowl contests, winning back-to-back national championship titles in 1970 and 1971 and again in 1994 and 1995. In 1997, Nebraska went 13-0 and played in its fourth title game in a five-year period, winning the national title as named by the coaches poll, but not by the AP. Most recently, the Huskers played Miami for the national title in the 2002 Rose Bowl.

The Huskers' back-to-back national championships in 1994 and 1995 marked the ninth time overall (by just six Division I schools) and first time in 16 years that a team had repeated, since Alabama won back-to-back titles in 1978-79. Nebraska is only the second school to win undefeated and consensus back-to-back national titles, the first since Oklahoma accomplished that feat in 1955-56. No Division I-A school has won three consecutive national championships.

Hall of Fame Coach Bob Devaney (who passed away in May of 1997) won Nebraska's first national title in 1970 and repeated in 1971. Three teams, counting Nebraska, have repeated twice, including Oklahoma (1955-56 and 1974-75) and Alabama (1964-65 and 1978-79). Nebraska and Oklahoma are the only schools, since the coaches began picking national champions, to be unanimous repeat champions, in both polls, posting perfect, back-to-back national championship seasons. OU went 11-0 in 1955 and 10-0 in 1956. Nebraska (1994, 1995, 1997 by coaches) and Notre Dame (1946, 1947, 1949 by AP) are the only two teams to win three national titles in a four-year period.

NU Tied for Fifth in AP Titles

Notre Dame leads the nation winning eight Associated Press national titles since 1936, with Oklahoma (7), Alabama (6), Miami (5), Nebraska and Minnesota are tied for fifth with four. While the Huskers were awarded the national title by the coaches in 1997, NU finished second to Michigan in the Associated Press poll. In 1970, NU was awarded the AP national title, but not the coaches (Texas was first, Ohio State second and NU third as the final poll was released before the bowl games were played). In the coaches poll (since 1950), Nebraska is tied for third with USC and Miami with four titles, behind Alabama's and Oklahoma's six.

The Huskers vs. AP No. 1

In the past 12 years, the Cornhuskers have faced seven teams that finished the season ranked No. 1 and won or shared the national title—Colorado and Georgia Tech (Citrus Bowl) in 1990, Washington and Miami (Orange Bowl) in 1991, Florida State in the 1994 Orange Bowl; Oklahoma in 2000; and Miami in the 2002 Rose Bowl. In addition, Nebraska's 1993 Federal Express Orange Bowl opponent, Florida State, missed winning the 1992 national title by a field goal and finished No. 2.

The 1996 Fiesta Bowl game between Nebraska and Florida was the 30th meeting between the No. 1 and No. 2 AP teams, including 11 bowl games. The Huskers won 62-24, as Nebraska's 38-point margin of victory over Florida was the second largest in such games. Nebraska is 3-2 in No. 1 vs. No. 2 games, and 3-1 as the No. 1 team.

Big 12 Conference Home Opener

Nebraska opened its 2002 Big 12 home schedule with a 24-13 victory against Missouri last Saturday. The win marked the 25th straight season Nebraska has won its conference home opener, dating back to a 24-21 loss to Iowa State in 1977. The win over Missouri was NU's fourth against the Tigers in the 25-game streak.

NU Continues Non-League Success in 2002

Nebraska completed its 2002 non-conference schedule with a 38-14 victory over McNeese State on Oct. 5. The Huskers finished their non-conference season with a 4-1 record, marking the 21st straight season Nebraska has lost one game or fewer in non-league action. The Huskers are 18-1 in non-conference games under Head Coach Frank Solich and have not lost a non-conference game at home under his direction. In fact, Nebraska's last non-conference home loss came in 1991 at the hands of fourth-ranked Washington. Since that loss, Nebraska has reeled off 31 straight non-conference home victories.

Darlington Top 300 Wins at Nebraska

Nebraska secondary coach George Darlington has been a part of the Husker coaching staff since 1973, Tom Osborne's first season as head coach. Darlington was a part of all 255 of Osborne's victories at Nebraska and has been a part of 49 Husker victories with Frank Solich at the helm—good for a total of 304 victories as a member of the NU coaching staff. The long-time NU coach was presented the game ball and a plaque on the field by Solich at the conclusion of the Husker win over Utah State.

"You can travel all across the country and it would be hard to find another coach that has reached that accomplishment," Solich said. "That is an amazing feat that George has accomplished. He is a great coach that has recruited a number of great athletes."

Solich was on the mark regarding Darlington's accomplishment. Research indicates that Darlington is the first Division I-A assistant to be a part of 300 victories at the same school. Husker offensive line coach Milt Tenopir who joined Osborne's staff after one season is not far behind Darlington with 295 wins as a Husker assistant.

'97 Husker Team Fills NFL Rosters

Nineteen members of Nebraska's 1997 national championship team are on NFL rosters. Seven of Nebraska's 11 defensive starters from that season are currently playing in the NFL, including starters Mike Rucker (Carolina), Grant Wistrom (St. Louis), Jay Foreman (Houston), Eric Warfield (Kansas City) and Mike Brown (Chicago). Other current NFL starters who started for the 1997 NU include RB Ahman Green (Green Bay), FB Joel Makovicka (Arizona) and PK Kris Brown (Houston).

NCAA-Best Streak of 33 Straight Bowls

Including the 2002 Rose Bowl against Miami, Nebraska has now participated in 33 straight bowls, a continuing NCAA record. Nebraska's 40 bowl appearances overall are tied for fourth best, trailing Alabama's 51, Tennessee's 42, Texas' 41 and tied with USC's 40.

Nebraska has participated in a "major" bowl (BCS, Jan. 1 or top four) in 19 of the past 21 years. The 1998 Holiday Bowl appearance broke a streak of 17 consecutive major bowls. NU's 33 consecutive bowls streak began with a 45-6 win over Georgia in the 1969 Sun Bowl.

Nebraska is 20-20 all time in bowl games, 6-2 over the last eight years (2-2 under Solich). The 2002 Rose Bowl marked the 15th time in 17 bowl games that Nebraska has squared off against a team ranked among the top six. Nebraska's 1941 Rose Bowl appearance against Stanford (L, 13-21) was the school's first bowl appearance. Nebraska won four of its five national championships at the Orange Bowl, defeating Louisiana State in 1970, Alabama in 1971, Miami in 1994 and Tennessee in 1997. Nebraska defeated Florida in the 1996 Fiesta Bowl for the national championship following the 1995 season.

Nebraska became eligible for a 34th consecutive bowl trip with last week's win over Kansas.

Huskers Continue Academic Tradition

Nebraska continues to lead the nation in Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-Americans for all sports and all teams with 196; in first-team winners for all sports with 104; and also leads the nation in football academic honor winners with 59 first-team certificates and 76 football all-teams certificates. The 196 is 51 better than second-place Notre Dame, while the 59 is 21 more than second-place Notre Dame's 38.

Last season, Nebraska continued its streak of 15 straight years with at least one first-team Verizon/CoSIDA All-American when tight end Tracey Wistrom won first-team honors, following in the footsteps of his older brother Grant (1996, 1997). NU had nine Huskers qualify academically (3.2 or better cumulative GPA) and athletically (starter or important reserve) in 2001. Of those, Wistrom, fullback Judd Davies, rush end Chris Kelsay and offensive tackle Dave Volk were first-team Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-District VII selections.

The Husker football program also leads the nation with nine NCAA Today's Top Eight Award winners, 30 NCAA postgraduate scholarship winners and 20 National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame Scholar-Athletes, including Wistrom last season.

NU Grad Rates Rank High Nationally

Nebraska has led the Big 12 in four of the past five years in graduation rates (all except 2000). Nebraska's four-class (1990-91 to 1993-94) graduation rate was 57 percent. That figure is higher than the national average for all students (56 percent) and football student-athletes (50 percent). Nebraska's student-athlete graduation rate for all sports, which includes only those students who completed their eligibility at NU, is an outstanding 87 percent (national average is 81 percent). Nebraska was one of nine schools honored by the American Football Coaches Association, when the school received the 2002 Academic Achievement Award in late June. Nebraska was recognized for graduating 90 percent or more of its football student-athletes from the freshman class of 1996-97. Since Coach Solich's first year at the helm in 1998, 86 of his 95 seniors have earned their degree, including 22 of 23 last season.

This year's team has five student-athletes playing with degree in hand including Demoiné Adams, who became the second Husker all time to graduate in three years (also Bobby Newcombe 1999), Patrick Kabongo (also a junior), Justin Smith, Dahrran Diedrick and Ben Cornelsen.

Kelsay Awarded National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Award

Nebraska senior rush end Chris Kelsay is one of 14 college football players named to the 2002 National Scholar-Athlete Class by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame. The honorees will all receive postgraduate scholarships in the amount of \$18,000 from the NFF/HOF.

The honorees come from all NCAA divisions as well as the NAIA and Kelsay is one of six honorees from the Division I-A ranks. The Auburn, Neb., native is a finance major and carries a 3.549 cumulative grade-point average. On the field, Kelsay is a three-year starter and is one of three Husker captains for the 2002 season. Kelsay is scheduled to graduate this December and has already begun work on his MBA.

The postgraduate scholarship adds to the long list of academic awards Kelsay has received during his Husker career. He is a three-time first-team academic All-Big 12 selection and was a Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-District VII pick in 2001. He is also an eight-time Big 12 Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll member and a three-time High Honors Academic Medallion recipient.

Kelsay is one of three Big 12 players among the six Division I-A scholarship recipients. Oklahoma State offensive tackle Kyle Eaton and Texas Tech quarterback Kliff Kingsbury will also be awarded \$18,000 postgraduate scholarships. In addition, this year's NAIA selection was Nebraska Wesleyan wide receiver Luke Klinker, an Omaha native. Kelsay is the 20th Husker to receive a NFF/HOF postgraduate scholarship, giving Nebraska the most of any school. He is the fourth player to receive a postgraduate scholarship during Frank Solich's tenure as head coach, joining fullback Joel Makovicka (1998), rush end Kyle Vanden Bosch (2000) and tight end Tracey Wistrom (2001).

To be eligible for a National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame postgraduate scholarship, a player must be a senior or graduate student in his final year of eligibility, have a grade-point average of 3.0 or higher, have shown superior academic application and performance, have outstanding football

ability as a first-team player, and have demonstrated strong leadership and citizenship.

Senior Wingback Hassebroek Collecting Off-Field Recognition

Nebraska wingback Troy Hassebroek was announced as UNL's 2002 Homecoming King at halftime of Saturday's game with Kansas. Hassebroek became the first Husker football player to be named Homecoming King since the honor began in 1975.

The Homecoming King selection added to Hassebroek's off-field recognition. Before the McNeese State game, he was presented the Brook Berringer Memorial Scholarship. The scholarship is presented annually to a senior player, who is active in the community, following in the footsteps of quarterback Brook Berringer, who helped the Huskers to national championships in 1994 and 1995 before he was killed in a plane crash on April 18, 1996.

Earlier in the fall, Hassebroek was one of 11 Division I-A players named to the American Football Coaches Association Good Works Team. The Good Works Team annually honors players for their dedication and commitment to community service. From 1992 to 1996, the Good Works Team was selected by the College Football Association and when the CFA disbanded in 1997, the AFCA began selecting the team.

Hassebroek is a senior who originally joined the Husker program as a walk-on from Lincoln High. He is currently the vice president of Nebraska's Student-Athlete Advisory Board after serving as a representative from the football team in 2001-02. He is also a member of the Nebraska Football Unity Council. In the Lincoln community Hassebroek has volunteered for Meals on Wheels and participates in Team Spirit hospital visits. Hassebroek also created and implemented Trick or Treat Street "Halloween Fun Night," a program in which each of Nebraska's 23 teams hosted a game booth and interacted with at-risk youth from the community.

Since the start of the Good Works Team Nebraska has had a nation-leading eight players selected to the team. Previous Husker Good Works honorees include Troy Branch (LB, 1992, 1993); Donta Jones (OLB, 1994); Aaron Graham (C, 1995); Jared Tomich (RE, 1996); Dan Alexander (IB, 1999) and Patrick Kabongo (DT, 2001).

Husker Sideline Report...

► **Walk-ons Remain Crucial to Success...**On the preseason depth chart, 29 of the 94 Huskers listed (30 percent) were walk-ons when they first came to Nebraska. Of those, seven have started in 2002, including Sam linebacker Scott Shanle and punter Kyle Larson, who are both returning starters, wingback Troy Hassebroek, left cornerback Pat Ricketts, rover Aaron Terpening, cornerback Shane Siegel and split end John Klem. In reward of their hard work and dedication, five of the seven (not counting Siegel and Klem) have since been awarded scholarships.

► **Nebraska Natives...**Twelve Huskers who hail from Nebraska are listed as first-teamers on the NU depth chart, including seven on the offensive side of the ball, SE Wilson Thomas (Omaha), LG Mike Erickson (Omaha), RG Wes Cody (Fremont), TE Aaron Golliday (York), FB Judd Davies (Omaha), IB David Horne (Omaha) and WB Troy Hassebroek (Lincoln); four on the defensive side of the ball, LRE Chris Kelsay (Auburn), SLB Scott Shanle (St. Edward), MLB Barrett Ruud (Lincoln), RRE Trevor Johnson (Lincoln); and punter Kyle Larson (Funk).

► **Family Connections...**It's all in the family at NU, as several Huskers followed their fathers and brothers to NU. Those who followed in their older brothers' footsteps include: DB Delrick Williams (2002-present, brother, Jamel, 1994-96); RE Chris Kelsay (1998-present, brother Chad, 1995-98); FS Dan Burrow (2000-present, brother Jamie, 1998-2001); LCB Cole Biodrowski (2002-present) and SE Brandon (2001-present); WB Adam Hassebroek (2001-present) and WB Troy (1998-present); and FS Andrew Shanle (2002-present) and SLB Scott (1998-present). The Huskers welcomed the first set of scholarship twins in the program's history last year in redshirt freshmen Josh (FS) and Daniel Bullocks (Rover).

Second generation Huskers include the Burrows (father Jim played in 1974-75 and is now a graduate assistant for NU); junior rover IB Josh Davis

(father Tony played in 1973-75); FS Brett Lindstrom (father Dan played in 1978-80); MLB Barrett Ruud (father Tom played in 1972-74 and Ruud's great-grandfather Clarence Swanson played for NU from 1918 to 1921 and is a member of the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame); RE Trevor Johnson (father Robert wrestled for NU in 1973-76) and RCB Shane Siegel (father Robert played basketball for NU in 1974-77).

► **Non-Redshirts...**Along with five true freshmen who have played this season, nine other Huskers have bypassed redshirt seasons during their careers. The following are listed along with their true freshman year: Philip Bland (2001); Barrett Ruud (2001); Mike Stuntz (2001); Willie Amos (2000, will redshirt in 2002 due to injury); Terrell Butler (2000); T.J. Hollowell (2000); Benard Thomas (2000, may redshirt in 2002); John Garrison (1999); and Jason Lohr (1998).

► **Huskers in the NFL...**35 former Huskers were listed on opening day NFL rosters in 2002. With four selections in the 2002 draft, NU has had 221 players picked since 1970, an average of seven per year. The Huskers rank 11th nationally with 30 first-round draft picks (including 11 in the last 16 drafts). Huskers drafted in 2002 include Outland Trophy finalist Toniau Fonoti (second round, San Diego), Heisman Trophy winner Eric Crouch (third round, St. Louis), All-American Keyuo Craver (fourth, New Orleans) and Tracey Wistrom (seventh, Tampa Bay).

► **Husker Running Back Success in the NFL...**A pair of former Husker I-backs found success in the NFL in 2001. Green Bay's Ahman Green (1995-97) ranks among the NFL rushing leaders and topped 1,000 yards for the second straight season and was selected to the Pro Bowl, while Correll Buckhalter (1997-2000) ranked among the Eagles' rushing leaders with nearly 600 yards, including an Eagles' rookie record with 134 yards against Arizona in October. Four former NU running backs are on NFL teams, including starting fullbacks Joel Makovicka (1995-98) with the Arizona Cardinals and Cory Schlesinger (1992-94) with the Detroit Lions.

► **Pipeline to the NFL...**Under longtime Husker offensive line coach Milt Tenopir, Nebraska offensive linemen have enjoyed unparalleled success with six Outland Trophy winners, two Lombardi Award winners and 21 All-Americans in Tenopir's 28 seasons at NU. Eight former Husker linemen are in the NFL, including former Outland winners Will Shields (1992, Kansas City) and Zach Wiegert (1994, Jacksonville). Adam Treu (Oakland), Dominic Raiola (Detroit) and Brenden Stai (Washington) join Shields and Wiegert as starters for their respective teams. Other Husker offensive linemen in the NFL include Chris Dishman (Arizona), Aaron Graham (Tennessee) and Toniau Fonoti (San Diego). Raiola and Hochstein both earned first-team All-America honors in 2000. Of the 15 linemen chosen for the Walter Camp All-Century team in 1999, nearly a quarter of the players selected were NU linemen coached by Tenopir (guards Aaron Taylor, Will Shields and Dean Steinkuhler and center Dave Rimington).

► **Orange Bowl Record...**Coach Frank Solich holds the Orange Bowl record for most kickoff return yards in a game, with 130 in 1966. Solich was the first Husker to rush for more than 200 yards (204 vs. Air Force, 1965) and remains the only fullback to do so.

► **Former Head Coach Tom Osborne...**Former coach and current Congressman Tom Osborne coached the Huskers to three national championships (1994, 1995, 1997) and retired as head football coach on Dec. 10, 1997. He is the only collegiate football coach to retire as a reigning national champion. Osborne now serves in the United States Congress, as a representative of Nebraska's third congressional district. Osborne was re-elected for a second term in the Nov. 5 general election. Osborne received 93 percent of the vote, easily outdistancing opponent Jerry Hickman. IN Cherry County, Osborne received all 2,082 votes that were counted. Osborne's and his Teammates mentoring program will be recognized at the Nebraska-Colorado game on Nov. 29 at Memorial Stadium.

A Look at the Numbers

► Scoring Drives...

The Huskers' 47 scoring drives (38 TD, 9 FG) by the offense have covered an average of 54.3 yards (2,550 total yards/47 drives). Nebraska produced its shortest drive in terms of plays, yards and time with a one-play, 2-yard drive in just four seconds with Judd Davies' 2-yard run against Iowa State. NU had two, one-play drives against ISU, including Jammal Lord's 90-yard TD strike to Ross Pilkington. NU's other one-play drive came with a Lord 23-yard pass to Wilson Thomas against Utah State. The Huskers marched on their longest drive with a 16-play, 91-yard drive that took 6:59 against Troy State. NU added a 16-play, 82-yard drive that resulted in a Josh Brown field goal vs. McNeese State. Texas managed a season-long 97-yard drive that lasted 17 plays and 7:45 in the third quarter. Troy State owns a season-short one-play, six-yard drive that lasted just seven seconds.

► Long Season Plays (25 or more yards)...

The Huskers have produced 51 long plays on the year, including a season-high nine long plays against Kansas, including five long runs, three long returns and one long pass. Nebraska has been almost equally dangerous in both long runs and long returns with 23 long runs and 19 long returns. Jammal Lord owns 11 of Nebraska's 23 long runs, including a career-long 57-yard sprint against McNeese State. Mark LeFlore owns NU's longest run of the year with a 64-yard scoring run against McNeese State. DeJuan Groce has provided Nebraska's biggest play threat on returns with five long returns, including three touchdowns. Groce's 89-yard scoring return against Missouri was the third-longest punt return in school history. He added TD returns of 83 and 72 yards against Troy State to tie an NCAA record. Aaron Terpening added a 30-yard punt return for a touchdown against Kansas after Lannie Hopkins' block, while Cory Ross pitched in a 25-yard punt return against the Jayhawks, giving NU seven long punt returns on the year. Josh Davis owns 10 long kickoff returns on the year, including a season-long 46-yarder against Texas. NU's two other long returns have come after interceptions, including Delrick Williams' 34-yard return against Kansas and Fabian Washington's 29-yard interception return for a score against Arizona State. Nebraska has also shown big play ability through the air, as Lord has connected on nine long pass plays, including a 90-yard scoring strike to Ross Pilkington at Iowa State. Texas A&M's Byron Jones produced the longest opponent play this season with his 66-yard fumble return for a touchdown. Troy State's Hansell Bearden hit Heyward Skipper on a 60-yard pass play, while Missouri's Zack Abron owns the longest run by an opponent (48).

► Nebraska in the Red Zone...

The Huskers have been successful in the red zone, including Kansas (3-3), Texas (2-4), Texas A&M (4-4), Oklahoma State (3-3), Missouri (2-3), McNeese State (3-4) Iowa State (1-1), Penn State (1-1), Utah State (3-4), Troy State (3-4), Arizona State (3-3). NU has 19 rushing touchdowns, four passing touchdowns and two field goals. Texas (4-4), Texas A&M (3-4), Oklahoma State (3-3), Missouri (2-2), McNeese State (1-2), Iowa State (6-7), Penn State (6-6), Utah State (2-2), Troy State (3-4) and Arizona State (1-2) have converted red zone trips. Kansas (0-1) did not convert its only red zone chance against the Huskers.

► Nebraska Points Off Turnovers...

On the year, NU has intercepted 13 passes and recovered four fumbles for 17 turnovers gained. DeJuan Groce (2 vs. TSU, 2 vs. USU) and Fabian Washington (ASU, KU, 2 vs. ISU) lead the Huskers with four interceptions each. Pat Ricketts owns two interceptions (USU, A&M), while Philip Bland (A&M), Josh Bullocks (UT) and Delrick Williams (KU) each have one interception on the year. The Huskers converted both of Groce's interceptions against Utah State. Along with Washington's 29-yard TD return vs. Arizona State, the NU offense also converted Washington's fumble recovery at Oklahoma State and his interception against Kansas into touchdowns. NU turned Ricketts' interception at Texas A&M into a field goal to give NU 38 points off turnovers this season. Bland (IS), Ricketts (TSU) and Chad Sievers (KU) have added fumble recoveries this season, but none were converted into points.

► **Husker 100-Yard Rushing Games (9)**

The Huskers have produced nine 100-yard rushing efforts on the year, including double 100-yard efforts against Kansas and Texas A&M. Most recently, David Horne (122) and Dahrran Diedrick (107) both rushed past the century mark in the win over Kansas. It was Diedrick's first 100-yard effort of the year, while Horne has three 100-yard performances. Jammal Lord leads the Huskers with five 100-yard efforts on the season, including a school quarterback record with 234 yards on 23 carries against Texas. Lord's effort tied Roger Craig (Florida State, 1981) for the 10th-best single-game total in NU history. It was Lord's second 200-yard performance of the year, joining his 218 yards on 17 carries vs. McNeese State, which is the second-best effort by a quarterback in NU history. Lord (159) and Horne (128) combined for NU's first double 100-yard rushing game of the season in Nebraska's 38-31 win over Texas A&M. Lord set an NU quarterback record with 30 carries against Texas A&M, and Horne set career highs with 128 yards and four touchdowns, while tying his career best with 24 carries against the Aggies. Three opposing backs, Penn State's Larry Johnson (19-123-2), Iowa State's Michael Wagner (19-107-0) and Oklahoma State's Tatum Bell (33-182-0) have managed 100 yards.

► **Starting Field Position**

Nebraska has started 35 of its 152 drives beyond midfield, including a season-best nine drives on Kansas' half of the field in a 45-7 win. Nebraska enjoyed a season-best +20.9-yard advantage in average starting field position against the Jayhawks (44.8-23.9). Opponents have managed just 17 drive starts on NU's side of the field. The Huskers have been forced to start 28 drives inside their own 20, with a worst start at the 1-yard line at Penn State, while opponents have started 30 drives inside their own 20. Kyle Larson has buried opponents inside the 20 on 16 occasions, including three each vs. Troy State and Oklahoma State. Larson pinned Kansas at its own 1 for the worst start by an opponent. Josh Brown has boomed 35-of-64 kickoffs for touchbacks, while 11 of his 29 others have stuck opponents inside the 20, including a worst start at the 6 by Arizona State.

► **Penalty Numbers**

The Huskers are averaging 6.0 penalties for 53.2 yards per game. NU owns the fourth-best averages in the Big 12 in penalties per game and yardage, while Kansas State ranks seventh in the league with just 7.0 penalties for 54.5 yards per game. Nebraska was flagged for just three penalties for 16 yards against Utah State, while the Aggies committed an opponent season-high 10 penalties for 71 yards. NU was penalized a season-high 10 times for 75 yards in the loss at Iowa State. Of NU's 66 penalties, 26 are offensive (26-211), 27 are defensive (27-250) and 13 have been called on the special teams (13-124). Opponents have committed 40 offensive penalties (40-266), 16 defensive penalties (16-125) and 10 special teams infractions (10-88).
